# The Central Project - Creating Community Hubs of our Schools

# An Open Google Docs Discussion



In 1979, <u>Central Public School</u> in Hamilton, Ontario Canada, was <u>saved</u> by leasing the top floor of the school to an insurance company, providing an innovative solution to prevent the school's closure.

Why the Central Project? In honor of <u>Central</u> public school which opened in 1853. It was the largest grade school in Upper Canada when it was built and the first building owned by the Hamilton Board of Education

There are obvious historical reasonings as to why saving this school was important, but the creative solution to save the school though should be an inspiration for us all to come up with innovative alternatives to save our own community schools.

I've thought a bit about the name I have given this project. I had been looking for this example of renting out empty space to businesses, and the name seemed fitting at that time. I didn't like the idea of using the name 'central' in the title in some

regards though, because that's exactly what our school boards are doing. Centralizing. Tearing down our community schools and shipping our children on transit to a centrally located school.

Centralizing or creating mega anything, is not the direction we should be heading either in education or in business.

Today, however, I realized that the reference to the first school in Upper Canada can work if we look at this as more of a central repository of ideas, thoughts, dreams, and concerns. A central place where we share how you already have or how we might creatively fill empty school space. A central database of other communities across the globe faces these same threats of closing schools.

In closing, no school should be shut down in the name of money or low enrollment today. Schools are hubs. We have lost sight of this.

Central wasn't the only school that we rented out. Highview on the east mountain was also wholly rented out for a time. The business that rented it even installed air conditioning along at least part of the building. It, not unlike Central, is now bustling with the sounds of children again. As is often the case, neighborhoods go through a cycle, and not once during recent rounds of ARC reviews, have we talked about saving any schools or properties, for future demographic shifts.

So how do you suppose we fill these empty spaces?

"A general **definition of community hub** is that of a concept, community plan or urban design for a conveniently located public place that is recognized and valued in the local community as a gathering place for people, and an access point for a wide range of community activities, programs, services, and

events. A community hub can be general in nature, similar to a neighbourhood or multipurpose centre, or it can include specific public services such as a library, park, school, health care and/or social support programs. Although each hub is unique to the surrounding community, three objectives are common: service coordination and delivery, place-making, and community building.

The school as a community hub has a great number of variations in different communities. This paper discusses ten different education models that may be considered community hubs."

The Schools as Community Hubs Project involves two pilot schools in our district, St. Alphonsus School and St. Patrick School. Edmonton Catholic Schools will bring together key community partners such as Catholic Social Services, the City of Edmonton, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Rotary, The Family Centre, and The Support Network, to create wrap-around community hubs for at-risk youth, children and families, where they live. The Schools as Community Hubs will integrate faith, life, and culture according to the District's foundation statement.

Walking is known to improve academic performance. Children arrive brighter and more alert for their first morning class. In a UK Department for Transport survey, nine out of ten teachers said their students are much more ready to learn if they've walked to school.
