Anna gave us a broad overview of the League year. It was an incredibly successful and busy year and now are looking at what is ahead for the LWV of Maine.

- The combination of an election year and COVID made for a great challenge. Connected with over 250,000 voters through various formats: voter guide, texts, registrations etc.
- Provided local ballot information in over 200 communities
 Information in 5 languages 400 volunteers: text banking, phone calls, research, door knocking, election observation, outreach to town clerks. Great effort in understanding how each town was doing the election. Provided help for local town clerks in over 100 polling locations observing: No election disturbances, good COVID protocols, In all 16 counties with over 100 volunteers doing observations.
 People really wanted to be involved.

Record absentee turn out, smooth elections overall.

Very impressed with how many new people became involved.

Where are we now, going ahead. What to do with all this energy Advocacy: New legislative session

- On line voter registration
- Secretary of State office to have resources to provide information to towns

National Popular Vote

Ban on Corporate contributions to candidates 100 bills to testify on!

Application: how to apply what we have learned on elections to local communities

- Basic civics education: how does town meeting work, how are towns organized

What is the best way to get young people involved in our chapter?

- Ask them to share their experiences. What is their lived experience of being a student
- Set up an event and have them involved. Use the youth counsel to get that information out.

Be transparent about what we are looking for. How can we help make what they want to happen, happen. Don't patronize or talk down to. Maintain our connections with the schools we have worked with over the past couple of years. Get student activists connected with their local legislators
