City Walking Tour

1. Piazza della Loggia

Start your tour at Piazza della Loggia, a beautiful example of Renaissance architecture in Northern Italy. Piazza della Loggia is surrounded by elegant buildings, including the Loggia itself, which serves as the town hall. The square also features an impressive astronomical clock from the 16th century.

2. Duomo Vecchio (Old Cathedral) and Duomo Nuovo (New Cathedral)

A short walk leads to the adjacent cathedrals. The Duomo Vecchio, also known as La Rotonda, is notable for its circular shape and medieval architecture. Right next to it, the Duomo Nuovo impresses with its baroque façade and imposing size.

3. Teatro Grande

An important cultural venue in Brescia, the Teatro Grande is known for its rich history and architectural beauty. It has been a cornerstone for the performing arts in the city since the 17th century, hosting opera, ballet, and theater performances. Visiting hours Friday from 1.30pm to 7.00pm, Saturday from 10.00am to 1.00pm and from 3.30pm to 7.00pm. Tickets can be bought online here or at the theater counter.

4. Piazzale Arnaldo

Named after Arnaldo da Brescia, a local religious reformer and patriot, this square is a popular meeting place in the city. It is surrounded by cafes and historical buildings, offering a glimpse into the city's vibrant social life. Good place to stop for a coffee or aperitivo.

5. Parco archeologico di Brixia romana

6. Brescia Castle

Head uphill to the Castle of Brescia, offering panoramic views of the city. Brescia Castle is a formidable medieval fortress offering panoramic views of the city and its surroundings. Inside, it houses museums that delve into the history and archaeology of Brescia. Entrance to the castle park is free. The opening hours are Monday to Sunday 6:00-23:00.
