- ★ In this section I will be adding feedback and important disclaimers to certain things and that have been helpfully pointed out by the community.

→ SOCIAL WORKERS:

- ◆ A narrative by a former social worker which I thought was very important to point out:
  - Suspicions of child abuse can lead to violently destroying Black and Brown families
  - Social workers have a history of doing more harm than good and aid in provocation of the separation of families
- ◆ Recommended to refer to instead: We will continue updating the document with more locally based communities that provide housing and other resources to children, (single) families, etc.

→ HOTLINES:

- ◆ Hotlines though helpful can sometimes not be as reliable or as resourceful as initially thought, here I will share both positive and negative experiences by people who have called and utilized a hotline. For this reason we are updating to include more local organizations with more resources to give so that the community can refer to as well.
1. “When some former neighbors were having what sounded to be one of their frequent, very violent fights (screams of “get off me”, furniture breaking, etc) I looked up and called the domestic violence hotline. I knew I didn’t wanna call the police on them. The hotline told me they provide resources but do not to do interventions and my only option in that scenario was to call 911. If something is happening in the moment, most of these hotlines will tell you to call the police. Most of them do not have response teams. Philly really needs more crisis intervention services and teams that have their own, separate staff. ”
  2. “When struggling with suicidal ideation, the National Suicide Hotline chat feature helped me to ride out the impulse. The staff members are trained to help with many different issues not just suicide! If you are struggling with mental illness, suicide, self harm, sexuality, etc, then the hotline is super helpful.”
