Re: Ohio Statewide Poll Results

Key Findings

A poll from Change Research of 1,209 voters in Ohio conducted from September 2-7, 2022 shows that Republicans are deeply unpopular, especially among suburban women, and are at risk of losing their statewide races due in part to their out of touch abortion bans that are opposed by majorities of likely voters:

- Tim Ryan is leading J.D. Vance by 5 points. Vance's statements about women raise doubts about him with 62% of all voters, and 73% of suburban women.
- All Ohio Supreme Court races are all close and 66% say they are more important this year than previous elections.
- Nan Whaley is trailing Mike DeWine by 6 points (more below).

Media polls showing a greater differential between DeWine and Whaley may be catching onto a Trump bump, as DeWine was endorsed by Trump on September 8 and attended a widely-publicized Trump rally in Ohio on September 17. But DeWine has a problem with Trump voters that media polls are missing. When we gave voters the option not to vote in the governor's race (media polls do not give this option), 7% chose that option. Looking at the crosstabs, these are almost exclusively Trump voters. Media polls should not assume Trump supporters will pull the lever for DeWine. When given the option not to, that's what they choose. Meanwhile, the 10% who are "unsure" are politically mixed - and disproportionately suburban moms.

Other key findings include:

- **Ohioans want to protect abortion access and are worried about abortion bans.**

All proposals, current laws, and ideations of abortion bans in Ohio have deep unpopularity with voters. And voters are reacting to a deeply unpopular total ban on abortion. Ohioans are not as extreme as Republicans in the state legislature, State Supreme Court, Mike DeWine, or J.D. Vance, and they are reacting strongly to these proposals.

This is happening within the context of the story around the 10 year-old girl who had to leave the state to seek abortion care, which has captured the attention of 83% of people, bringing in the focus of the cruelty of this law.

This is not just Democrats: over two-thirds of independents, those who will decide this election, and even one-third of Republicans oppose these laws. These laws are particularly unpopular among suburban women.

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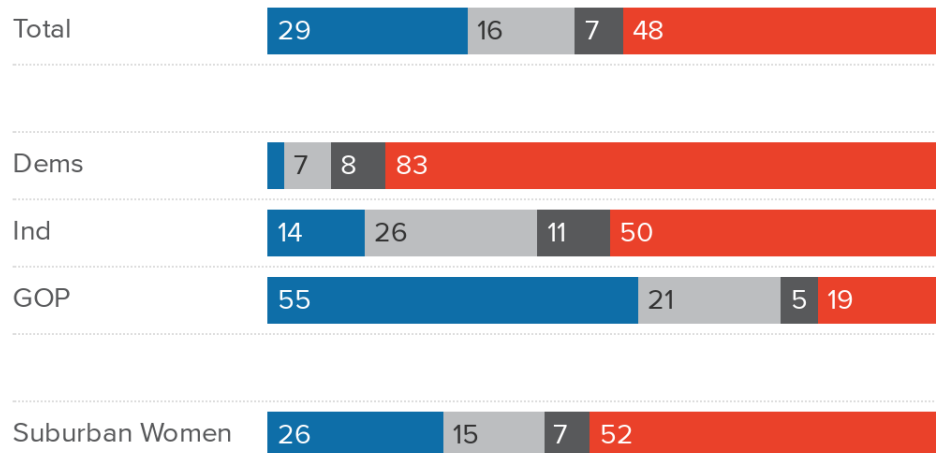


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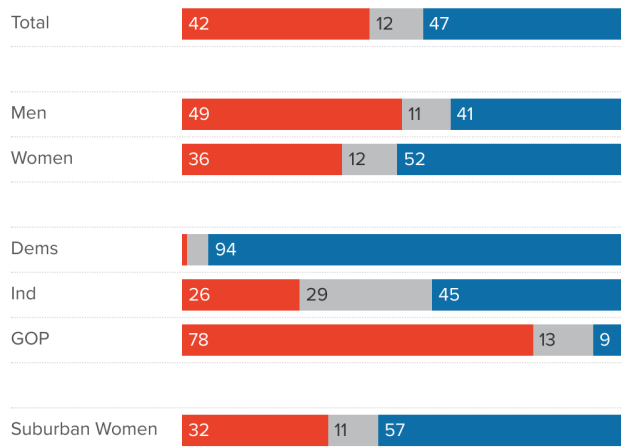
- **JD Vance is highly unfavorable, especially in regards to how he talks about women and his extreme position on abortion.**

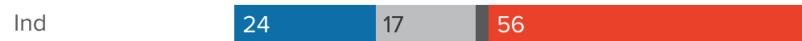
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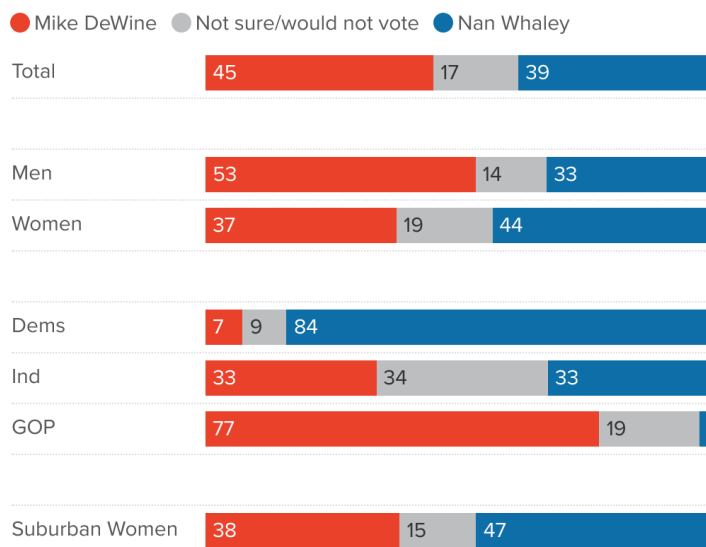
- **Mike DeWine is struggling to retain Republican voters and is unfavorable with Democratic voters, including those who once viewed him favorably.**

Whatever favorability among Democrats that Governor DeWine gained with his initial handling of COVID-19 has diminished greatly among likely voters. He is struggling to consolidate his base, with much of undecided voters viewing him unfavorably.

● Favorable ● Neutral ● Never heard of ● Unfavorable

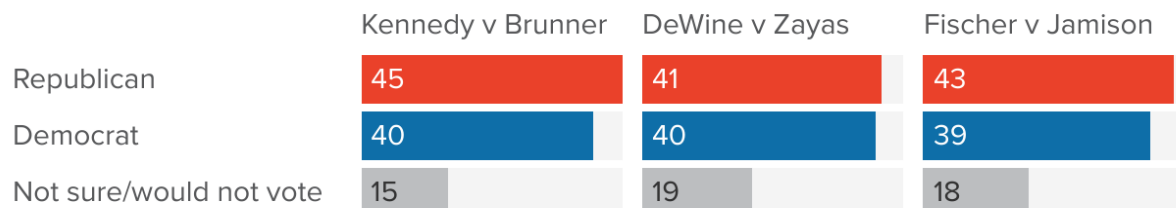


While Nan Whaley has lower name recognition, she is within six points of defeating Mike DeWine. Voters express openness to voting for a Democratic candidate, as shown through Tim Ryan's lead in the Senate ballot. Voter needs to be introduced to Nan Whaley, and the issue of abortion, particularly with suburban women, may just be a critical element. This may help consolidate more undecided and on the fence voters to choose Nan Whaley as an alternative to an unpopular Governor DeWine.



- **The Ohio Supreme Court race is very close.**

Among all likely voters, 66% say that the Supreme Court races are more important this year than previous elections, and that is reflected in the closeness of the ballots in Ohio.





METHODOLOGY

Change Research surveyed 1209 voters in Ohio conducted from September 2-7, 2022. We used the following sources to recruit respondents:

- targeted advertisements on Facebook and Instagram. (1025 respondents)
- text messages sent, via the Switchboard platform, to cell phone numbers listed on the voter file for individuals who qualified for the survey's sample universe, based on their voter file data (184 respondents)

Regardless of which of these sources a respondent came from, they were directed to a survey hosted on SurveyMonkey's website. Ads placed on social media targeted any registered voter living in Ohio. As the survey fielded, Change Research used dynamic online sampling: adjusting ad budgets, lowering budgets for ads targeting groups that were overrepresented and raising budgets for ads targeting groups that were underrepresented, so that the final sample was roughly representative of the population across different groups. The survey was conducted in English.

The survey was commissioned by Red Wine, and Blue, and conducted online by Change Research. Post-stratification was performed on age, gender, race/ethnicity, region, and 2020 presidential vote. Weighting parameters were estimated based on the electorates from the 2020 general election, obtained from the voter file. That is, if a given age bracket or gender group represented x% of the 2020 electorate, then that same group would be roughly weighted to x% in this survey.

The modeled margin of error* for this survey is 3.0%, which uses effective sample sizes** that adjust for the design effect of weighting.

* We adopt The Pew Research Center's convention for the term "modeled margin of error"⁽¹⁾ (mMOE) to indicate that our surveys are not simple random samples in the pure sense, similar to any survey that has either non-response bias or for which the general population was not invited at random. A common, if imperfect, convention for reporting survey results is to use a single, survey-level mMOE based on a normal approximation. This is a poor approximation for proportion estimates close to 0 or 1. However, it is a useful communication tool in many settings and is reasonable in places where the proportion of interest is close to 50%. We report this normal approximation for our surveys assuming a proportion estimate of 50%.

** The effective sample size adjusts for the weighting applied to respondents, and is calculated using Kish's approximation ⁽²⁾.
