

Title – Not More than 15 Words (16-Point Book Antiqua, Bold, Centered, Uppercase, One Column Format)

Author's Name, 12-point Book Antiqua, Bold, Centered, Do not use academic titles

Affiliation (11-point Times New Roman, Italics, Centred. Affiliation includes: Name of Department, Faculty, Name of University, Address, Country)

Author(s) email, font size 11, centered, single spacing

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Abstract: The heading Abstract should be typed in bold. The body of the abstract should be typed in normal 10-point Book Antiqua in a single paragraph, immediately following the heading. The text should be set to 1 line spacing. The abstract should stand alone, meaning there are no citations in it. Abstract should tell the prospective reader what you did and highlight the key findings. Avoid using technical jargon and uncommon abbreviations. You must be accurate, brief, clear, and specific. In the abstract, explicitly write in bold: Introduction, gap in literature or discrepancies between theories and practices, purpose of study, method, main findings, and conclusion. The abstract should be 150-225 words long.

Keywords: *Keyword one; keyword two; keyword three; keyword four; keyword five* – Book Antiqua, 10, Italic, single spacing. Each word/phrase in the keyword should be separated by a semicolon (;), not a comma (,).

INTRODUCTION

The article should be between 8-10 pages (between 4000-5000 words), single-spaced, 12-point Book Antiqua. Use no indent for the first paragraphs and do not leave a space between paragraphs.

Use APA Citation 7th edition for in- text citations and the reference list. For in-text citations, use the author's name and year (Author, 2024), and if there are direct quotes, then provide the page number (Author, 2023, p. 21 or pp. 21-22). If you are citing more than one reference, put them in year order (Yohanes, Wendelinus Dasor, 2020; Rohana, Ahmad, 2025). For a reference with up to five authors, use all the names in the first instance (Author1, Author2, Author3, Author4, & Author5, 2017), and then use the first author *et al.* subsequently (Author1 *et al.*, 2024). Do not use footnotes.

In the Introduction, the authors should state the objectives of the work at the end of the introduction section. Before the objective, Authors should provide an adequate background, at that point very short literature survey to record the existing solutions/method, to show which is the best of previous researches, to show the main limitation of the previous researches, to show what do you hope to achieve (to solve the limitation), and to show the scientific merit or novelties of the paper. Avoid a detailed literature survey or a summary of the results (Fadli et al., 2025).

METHOD

The method should enable readers to reproduce the experiment. Provide sufficient detail to allow the work to be reproduced. Methods already published should be indicated by a reference: only relevant modifications should be described. Do not repeat the details of established methods (Creswell, 2009). The method

section covers: Respondents, Instruments, Procedures, and Data analysis (Creswell & Clark, 2011; Sarwono, 2011).

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

Results should be clear and concise. The results should summarize (scientific) findings rather than providing data in great detail (Hasbullah et al., 2023). Please highlight the differences between your results or findings and the previous publications by other researchers.

The discussion should explore the significance of the results of the work, not repeat them. A combined Results and Discussion section is often appropriate. Avoid extensive citations and discussion of published literature (Muhammad Sidek; Suparto Iribaram; Hasbullah, 2025). In discussion, it is the most important section of your article. Here you get the chance to sell your data. Make the discussion corresponding to the results, but do not reiterate the results. Often should begin with a summary of the main scientific findings (not experimental results). The following components should be covered in the discussion: How do your results relate to the original question or objectives outlined in the Introduction section (what)? Do you provide a precise interpretation for each of your results or findings presented (why)? Are your results consistent with what other investigators have reported (what else)? Or are there any differences?

For Tables and Figures, place names of Figures after the figures and Tables preceding them using 12-point Book Antiqua for the title.

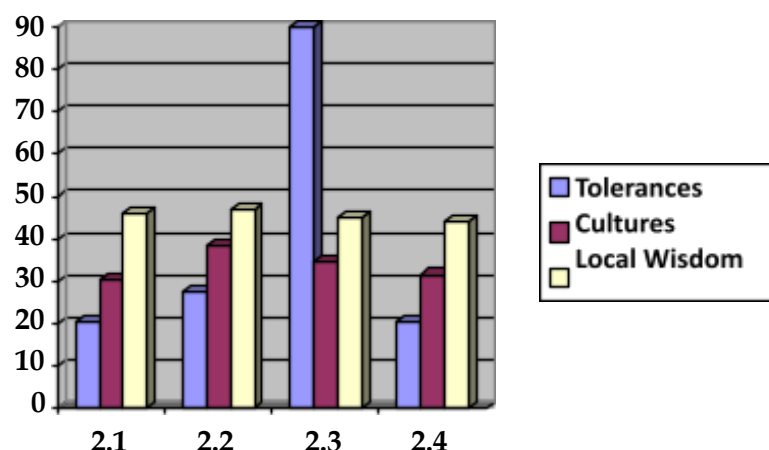

CONCLUSION

Conclusions should answer the research objectives. Tells how your work advances the field from the present state of knowledge. Without clear Conclusions, reviewers and readers will find it difficult to judge the work and whether or not it merits publication in the journal. Do not repeat the Abstract, or just list experimental results. Provide a clear scientific justification for your work, and indicate possible applications and extensions. You should also suggest future experiments and/or point out those that are underway.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Recognize those who helped in the research, especially the funding supporter of your research. Include individuals who have assisted you in your study: Advisors, Financial supporters, or any other supporter, i.e., Proofreaders, Typists, and Suppliers who may have given materials.

REFERENCES

- Cite the main scientific publications on which your work is based. Cite only items that you have read. Do not inflate the manuscript with too many references. Avoid excessive self-citations. Avoid excessive citations of publications from the same region. Check each reference against the source (authors' name, volume, issue, year, DOI number).
- Every source cited in the body of the article should appear in the reference, and all sources appearing in the reference should be cited in the body of the article.
- The sources cited should at least 80% come from those published in the last 10

years. The sources cited are primary sources in the forms of journal articles, books, and research reports, including theses and dissertations. Citations from journals should be at least 80% of the total references cited. Quotation and references follow APA style, and the latter should be included at the end of the article in the following examples:

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
