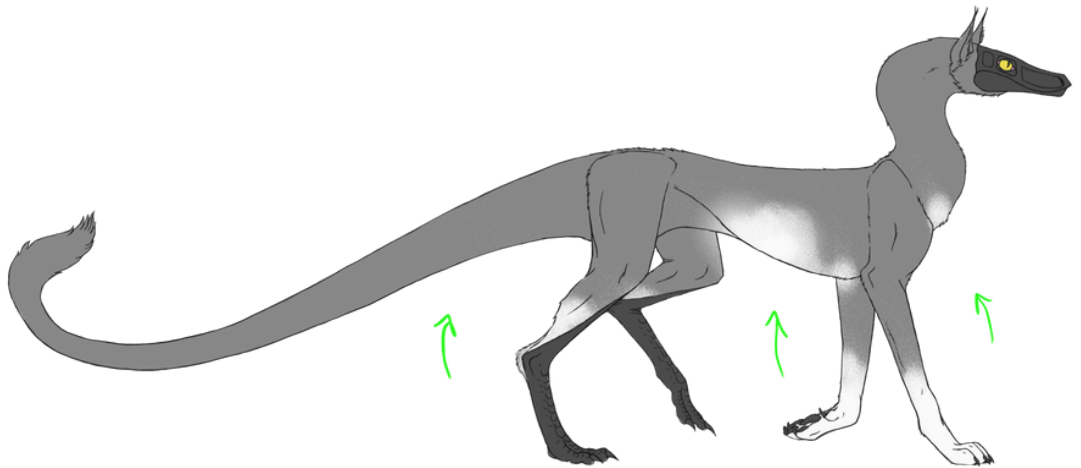


## Sabino

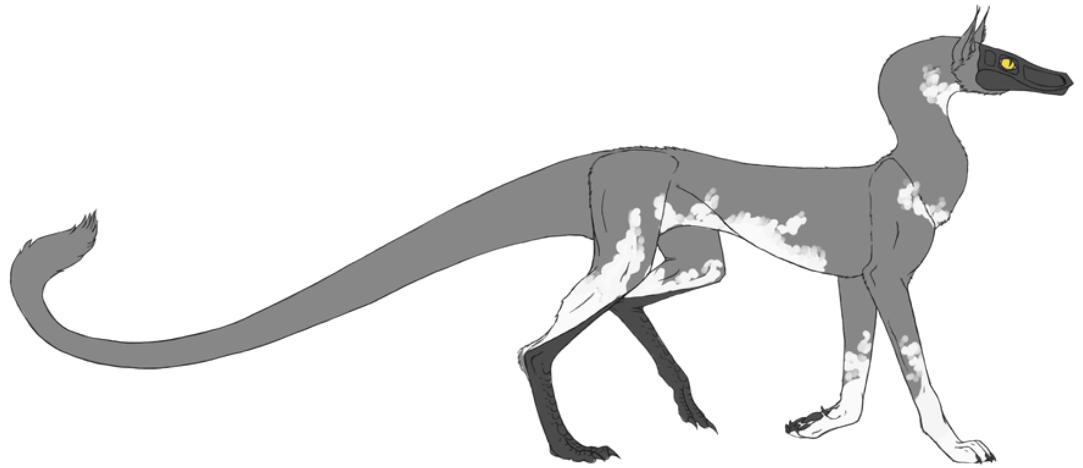
nSb or SbSb

- Sabino is a very tricky white marking as it has a lot of variation. However, it does come in two very distinct types, a harder lined type and a more airbrushed like type.
- Sabino always starts at the feet or underbelly of the Sindow and moves upward.

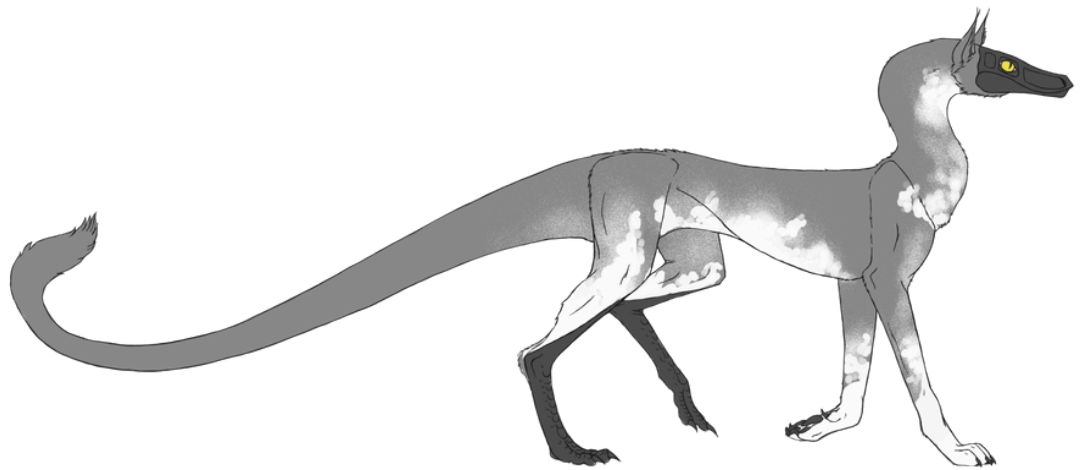
Below is a 'soft' or 'airbrushed' Sabino.



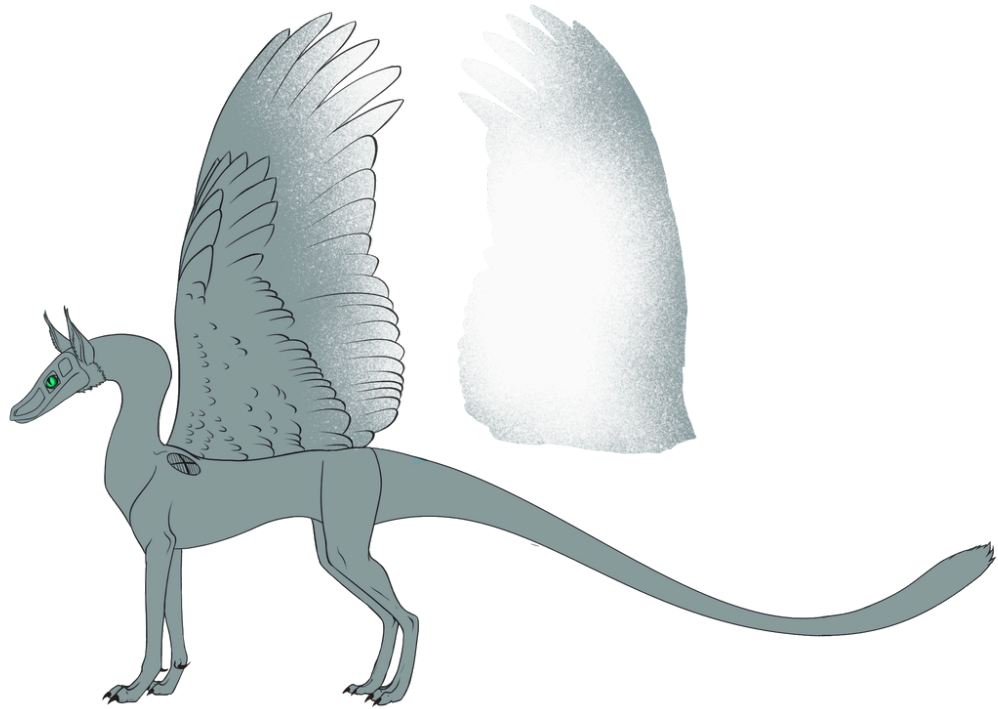
Here is a 'hard edged' Sabino, which isn't even completely hard edged. It's just not as soft as the airbrushed.



And you can have both types on the same Sindow.



**Wings Example:**



- This example is just showing an example with wings. It will ALWAYS show on the body.

**Minimum and Maximum:**

Minimum: The thing with Sabino is that sometimes it doesn't even show up. If you have a heterozygous Sabino ( $nSb$ ), you do not need to have the Sabino showing at all. But if you have a homozygous Sabino ( $SbSb$ ) it needs to have some Sabino showing.



Maximum: This is just a general max, as Sabino can turn the whole Sindow completely white, minus a few spots where the base shows through faintly. To have maxium Sabino you need a homozygous Sabino (SbSb).



**WITH WINGS:**



- Sabino can show on the wings. This is the nSb max, of course SbSb can make all the wings white.
- It does not have to show on the wings at all if you don't want it to.

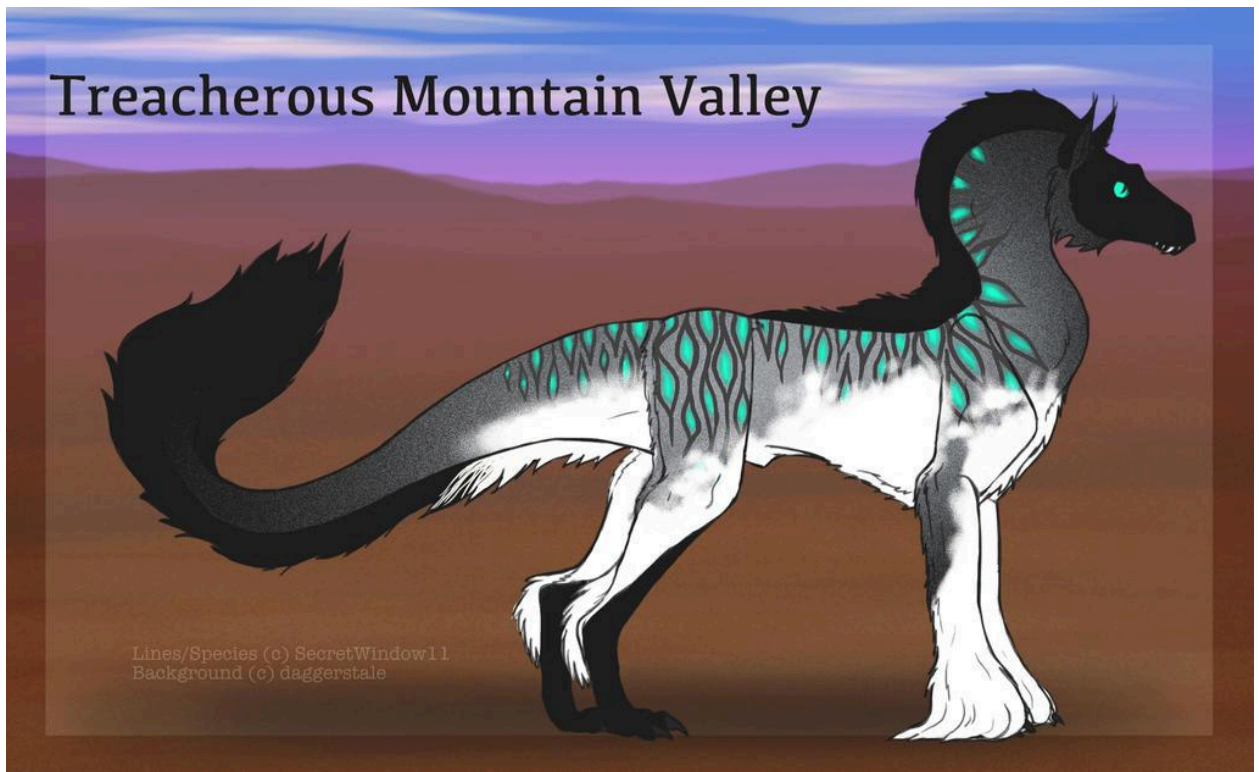
### **Design Tips:**

- Sabino is a tricky gene to identify in horses, but you can still find some really good examples on google. If you're ever unsure about whether or not your example is good or not, please just ask.
- Also, Sabino is a gene commonly found in Clydesdales. That's why most of them have white feet and even white on their bellies. So searching clydesdales will give you some awesome examples as well. Just remember, not all examples that show up are sabino.
