Course Description

The content of this course will be focused on the histories of three major powers in the Asia region: China, India and Japan. Beginning with a study of the state of these countries in the pre-modern era. The course proceeds to consider how these countries developed in different ways as the modern era progressed. Concluding with a look at how these countries evolved as the twentieth century unfolded.
