

A Formatted Technical Work for An IJIE Journal Paper (Center, Bold, 18 pt)

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Abstract:

These instructions give you guidelines for preparing papers for IJIE (Indonesian Journal of Informatics Education). Use this document as a template if you are using Microsoft Word 6.0 or later. Otherwise, use this document as an instruction set. Paper titles should be written in uppercase and lowercase letters, not all uppercase. Avoid writing long formulas with subscripts in the title; short formulas that identify the elements are fine (e.g., "Nd-Fe-B"). Do not write "(Invited)" in the title. The abstract must be a concise yet comprehensive reflection of what is in your article. In particular, the abstract must be self-contained, without abbreviations, footnotes, or references. It should be a microcosm of the full article. The abstract must be between 150–250 words. Be sure that you adhere to these limits; otherwise, you will need to edit your abstract accordingly. The abstract must be written as one paragraph, and should not contain displayed mathematical equations or tabular material. The abstract should include three to five different keywords or phrases, as this will help readers to find it. It is important to avoid over-repetition of such phrases as this can result in a page being rejected by search engines. Ensure that your abstract reads well and is grammatically correct.

Keywords: *First keyword, Second keyword, , up to Fifth keyword (in alphabetical order).*

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Introduction (14 pt)

This document is a template for the Word (doc) version. If you can use this version of the document as a reference to write your manuscript. The introduction describes the background of the completed problem, the gaps of the literature related to the problem, the research review previously conducted by other researchers relevant to the research undertaken.

When referring to your own work within the paper, avoid using terminology that might reveal your identity. Avoid phrases such as 'we have previously shown (reference)'. Instead use 'as previously shown (reference)'. (Please delete this guidance before submitting your paper).

The main text format consists of a flat left-right column on A4 paper. Text margin from top and bottom is 2 cm, right and left is 2.5 cm. The manuscript is written in Microsoft Word, single space, Times New Roman 10pt and maximum 12 pages. The title of the article should effectively describe the contents of the paper in 20 words maximum. Indexing and depreciation services depend on the accuracy of the title, extracting it from useful keywords in cross-reference and computer search.

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Research Method

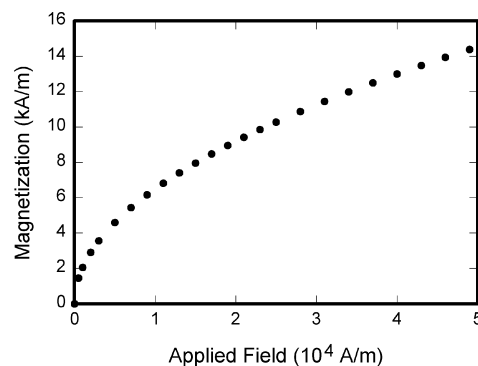


Figure 1. Effects of selecting different switching under dynamic conditions

Research Method (may include design of the research, data collection, data analysis, architecture, implementation, and evaluation of the trial), 4. Results and Discussion, 4. Conclusions and 5. Future works contain further research. Each paragraph can consist of several subparagraphs written with Arab numbering, as shown in the following section. The number of pages is a minimum of ten pages and a maximum of 12 pages A4 size. Make sure all of the tables and figures are addressed in the text. For example, Table 1 explicates the performance of example data, while Figure 1 depicts the Effects of selecting different switching under dynamic conditions.

Number equations consecutively with equation numbers in parentheses flush with the right margin, as in (1). Be sure that the symbols in your equation have been defined before the equation appears or immediately following.

Use “(1),” not “Eq. (1)” or “equation (1),” except at the beginning of a sentence: “Equation (1) is”

This section of a scientific paper is where the authors give credit to individuals, organisations, or institutions that contributed to the research but did not meet the criteria for authorship. For example, funding sources, technical assistance, advisory or intellectual support, administrative support, et cetera. Research based on a research grant is encouraged to mention the funding institution, grant/ contract number, and the primary researcher.

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
