OUR COMMUNITY

Livonia is a large suburban city of 94,044 people located 15 miles northwest of downtown Detroit. Livonia Public Schools, which includes a portion of adjacent Westland, consists of three comprehensive high schools (9-12), one career/technical center (11-12), three middle schools (7-8), three upper elementary schools (5-6), and twelve elementary schools (K-4).

SCHOOL CHARACTERISTICS

Franklin High School is a comprehensive four-year public high school enrolling approximately 1,300 students in grades 9-12. 39% of Franklin students receive free or reduced lunch. Our student body has a diverse ethnic distribution comprised of:

- 9% Black/African American
- 84% Caucasian
- 4% Hispanic/Latino
- <1% Multi Ethnic

FACULTY & STAFF

There are 80 professional staff members, including 5 administrators, 4 counselors (ratio of 325:1), and additional certified support personnel such as: a school psychologist, school social worker, student assistance provider, speech and language therapist, resource room teachers, teacher consultant outreach, occupational and physical therapist, and homebound or hospitalized services. Most teachers have master's degrees.

Twenty-three credits are required for the Class of 2023 to graduate from Franklin High School.

CURRICULUM

Franklin High School provides a comprehensive curriculum with most students taking college preparatory courses. Courses in Math, Science, Social Studies, and Language Arts range from basic to Accelerated and Advanced Placement.

ACADEMIC CALENDAR & UNIT OF CREDIT

The school year consists of two equal semesters. Students are required to take six courses each semester, but some students elect seven. Each semester, a full credit course meets one class period, every other day, and yields 0.5 unit of credit.

GRADING SYSTEM

The marking system is based on a 4.00 scale for an A. Pluses and minuses are used in GPA calculations. Accelerated and AP courses receive one extra honor point. Class rank is computed from final grades in all courses and incorporates all Franklin students.
