\$20M Saved on Textbook Costs for Washington Community & Technical College Students



According to data from SBCTC Data Services, in FY 21-22, 5,290 class sections used OER, with 57,857 students enrolled. Additionally, 3,264 class sections used low-cost materials, with 37,431 students enrolled, leading to \$10 million in savings for students. For FY 22-23, including data from Summer 22 to Winter 23, nearly 6,000 class sections utilized OER, enrolling 71,000 students. Additionally, over 4,000 class sections adopted I+ow-cost materials, with close to 50,000 students enrolled, resulting in estimated student savings exceeding \$12 million.
