



Executive Summary

U.S. bases in Bahrain are technically vulnerable but strategically buffered. While Iran and its proxies have both the intent and capability to strike these installations, especially amid escalating regional tensions, the likelihood of a **direct Iranian attack on Bahrain’s U.S. bases remains low to moderate, unless** the U.S. takes direct kinetic action against Iran or Iran’s leadership concludes that deterrence requires a bold strike. However, the **proxy threat**—especially from Iraqi militias and Yemen’s Houthis—is **active and persistent**, and could escalate quickly in the form of missile, drone, or cyberattacks.



Strategic Overview of U.S. Presence in Bahrain

Base	Function	Assets
NSA Bahrain	HQ of U.S. 5th Fleet	Aircraft carriers, destroyers, logistics command
Isa Air Base	Air support	F-16s, ISR aircraft

These sites are **high-value targets**, essential to U.S. operations in the Gulf, Red Sea, and Arabian Sea.



Threat Vectors: Iran and Proxy Actors

1. Iran (Central Government)

Factor	Assessment
Capability	High – Iran has thousands of ballistic missiles (e.g., Fateh, Zolfaghar), cruise missiles, and drones (e.g., Shahed-136, Ababil) capable of reaching Bahrain.
Intent	Conditional – Iran has <i>threatened</i> to strike U.S. bases if the U.S. engages in military operations against Iran or Israel.

Risk tolerance	Low for direct strikes – Iran prefers plausible deniability and avoids direct conflict with the U.S. unless cornered.
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Conclusion: Direct Iranian attack on Bahrain bases is **possible**, but would likely follow a **clear U.S. escalation**, e.g., a strike on Iranian territory.

2. **Hezbollah (Lebanon)**

- **Range:** No ability to strike Bahrain directly.
 - **Role:** Could divert U.S. attention or force deployment shifts by escalating in Lebanon or Syria.
 - **Likelihood of Bahrain attack:** **None directly; indirect** support to Iranian goals.
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3. **Hamas (Gaza)**

- **Range:** No reach to Bahrain.
 - **Current capability:** Focused on Israel.
 - **Likelihood of Bahrain attack:** **None.**
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4. **Houthis (Yemen)**

Factor	Assessment
Range	Medium to high – Iranian-provided missiles/drones have hit UAE and Saudi targets as far as 1,500 km away.
Motivation	High – anti-U.S. rhetoric; aligned with Iran’s regional goals.
Track record	Repeated attacks on Saudi, UAE, and Red Sea vessels; recently tested Israel-range drones.

Conclusion: Houthi attacks on Bahrain are **plausible**, particularly via **long-range drones or sea-based attacks** if conflict escalates. Their **deniability** makes them a useful tool for Iran.

5. Iraqi Militias (PMF, Kata'ib Hezbollah, etc.)

- **Capabilities:** Medium – have launched attacks on U.S. bases in Iraq and Syria using drones and rockets.
 - **Motivation:** High – openly anti-U.S., loyal to Iran's IRGC-QF.
 - **Projection:** **Unlikely to strike Bahrain directly**, but may escalate **regionally** in concert with an Iran-led escalation.

Final Conclusion

- **Bahrain’s U.S. bases are within Iranian and Houthi range** and are therefore legitimate targets **in the event of full-scale escalation**.
- Under current conditions:
 - **Direct Iranian strike is unlikely**, but **not off the table**.
 - **Proxy strikes (especially Houthi)** are the **most probable short-term threat vector**.
- U.S. deployments and evacuation authorizations signal **caution, not inevitability**.

Bahrain's Defense Capabilities (2025)

1. Bahraini Armed Forces (BDF) Capabilities

- **Size:** ~9,000–12,000 active personnel.
 - **Air Defense:**
 - Operates **Patriot PAC-3** batteries (acquired from the U.S. in recent years).
 - Limited number of **radar systems** and missile interceptors.
 - **No indigenous THAAD or Iron Dome equivalent.**
 - **Air Force:**
 - F-16s and newly upgraded F-16 Block 70s (procured from the U.S.) improve response time.
 - Surveillance and ISR support is still U.S.-reliant.
 - **Naval Capabilities:**
 - Very limited. Coastal patrol boats, no missile defense at sea.
 - U.S. Navy is the primary naval shield.
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U.S. & Regional Defense Shield

2. U.S. Assets in Bahrain

- **Naval Aegis systems** aboard U.S. destroyers/cruisers can intercept ballistic missiles.
- **C-RAM & short-range air defense** likely deployed around key bases (especially NSA Bahrain and Isa AB).
- **Patriot systems** protect high-value targets.

- **THAAD** not based in Bahrain, but nearby (e.g., UAE, Saudi Arabia) and can provide **regional coverage**.

3. 🤝 **GCC Regional Defense Integration**

- Bahrain is linked into **GCC-wide early warning radar and air defense network**, allowing:
 - Early detection of launches from Iran, Iraq, or Yemen.
 - Shared radar tracking with UAE, Saudi Arabia, Qatar.

Conclusion: Can Bahrain Defend Itself?

YES — with U.S. help and in a limited scenario:

- A **single missile or drone strike** could likely be intercepted.
- **Small-scale attacks** would probably be thwarted.
- U.S. early warning and interceptors drastically increase survival odds.

NO — against a sustained or saturation-style attack:

- If Iran or Houthis **launched swarms of drones or missile barrages**, Bahrain's air defenses would be overwhelmed.
 - Bahrain **relies heavily** on U.S. naval and air defenses for high-end threats.
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Bottom Line

Bahrain cannot fully defend itself alone against a determined missile or drone strike campaign, but **with U.S. and regional support, many attacks can be intercepted—especially limited or symbolic strikes**. A full-scale defense would require real-time U.S. involvement.
