2024 Survey Responses to Your Thoughts & Questions

Hey Parents!

There's a lot going on at Liberty Lake, and a lot of new families the past couple of years, so I'm pulling out some great comments that I want to make sure EVERYBODY understands- Thanks to the 300+ parents who took the time to help us improve LLDC, and for the accolades (the best ones are at the end of this document.)

- 1. "Elective process was tricky, as it took several weeks for our kids to get any of their top choices, due to us not fully understanding it."
 - a. This is an unintended consequence of the weekly "customization" that we do at LLDC. We will make sure to use all sources of communication to remind parents on Tuesday, that we export the elective choices and put them into our scheduling software at 9am Wednesday morning. Tracy has always sent Email reminders, but this year we will also have the "Campanion App" that you can download (now if you haven't), and we will send push notifications through that as well. We could text you- but have always preferred to use texting for more urgent types of contact.
- 2. "Was disappointed that our child didn't elevate their swim level during the month they attended."
 - a. New rule at LLDC- If something like this is happening, or ANYTHING swim related, my advice is to <u>Email your Division Leader ASAP</u>. The division leaders are your concierge, and will go up to the pool during swim instruction to figure out what's going on, and report back to you much more quickly than the aquatics team who aren't checking Emails during the camp day. They can also set up a call with the Aquatics team if necessary. Use the Division Leaders- They are here for you!
- 3. "My kids weren't happy about the food and food choices this summer."
 - a. Liberty Lake Day Camp's food service is one of the best in the business. I know this, because I eat it, I visit camps all over the country, and because MOST comments about the food were extremely POSITIVE. Food is like the weather-People (kids, in this case) love to complain about it. Last summer was the same food, and same caterers as the prior summer, yet from some of the surveys-you would think otherwise! Between the entrees, the awesome salad bar, pasta bar, sandwiches, yogurts, fresh fruit, desserts, ice pops/ice cream- There's lots of variety, with good quality. *A couple of things we are planning on improving are:* the Pizza on Mondays (they made the pizza in-house the past two summers), and integrating less hot entrees, given the summer heat we are dealing with more and more. If anyone has any suggestions for cold entrees, besides sandwiches and subs, and salad bar- please let us know, as we'll be meeting with the caterers soon to create next summer's menu!
- 4. PHILLY BUS SPECIFIC- "Our bus was late almost every day, made worse by the lack of communication- you must figure this out."

a. Two of our Philly buses last summer had chronic afternoon timing issues, coupled with a lack of communication from our staff on the bus- of which I only wish I knew about that aspect, as it could have been improved. In trying to eliminate the young staff from the equation if possible, I met with our Philly bus company last month, and they are currently working on three big things- (1) They are looking to make the routes more efficient, even if it means adding more buses to do so. (2) They are looking into giving us access to their GPS tracking software, so we can share it with you, and you can actually see where the bus is on the route. If they don't come through on this- Plan B- We will literally purchase an Apple Air-Tag for every bus, or something similar, and our staff will be better at communicating- as their jobs will depend on it. (3) First Student just purchased a NJ bus company- and NJ buses have seatbelts- So, they are seeing if it's possible to swap those buses into their Philly depot for us this summer. Thank you, Philly friends, for your awesome kids, and your patience- We are on this, I promise you!!

5. "I didn't like the constant reminders about tips"

a. I will see that the division leaders lighten up on this in their Emails. Please know that from weeks 3-8, various campers are ending their summer seasons each Friday with us- so the tip reminders are for those specific parents. That said, thanks to NJ minimum wage laws (almost double PA), our staff pay is looking pretty good of late!

6. "My child came home with a bandaid on, and we never received any communication about what happened."

a. Our Health Center sees around 100 campers each day, with all campers logged into our database with details of their visit- but we do not contact all 100 families. The nurses call or Email parents when they feel it's necessary- and it's often not-as 90% of their daily visitors leave with a bandaid, icepacks, or a comforting pep talk. So, if you don't get contacted when your child went to the Health Center, then the nurses (who are all moms of camp kids, themselves) made the decision that it wasn't something that you needed to worry about. The Nurses and Division Leaders are usually pretty good about contacting families when necessary. Thank you in advance for your trust with this. And if you want to ask the nurses about something specific, you can always Email them at nurse@libertylakedaycamp.com or call them on their direct line at (609) 372-4721 - just know that they may be busy with patients, and have to call you back at the end of the day.

7. "We wish that you still had Pre-week and Post-week to help our child care issues before and after your season!"

a. So do we! But, the issue is STAFFING. In June, we are subject to the whims of the NJ public school schedule, which often runs late due to snow days, and recently added Juneteenth which extends their calendar. In Summer 2021, we ran our first week of camp with hardly any teachers (⅓ of our staff) - as they were still in school.) In mid-August, we are at the mercy of the colleges, which brought back their students earlier in August during the pandemic, and MANY NEVER

CHANGED BACK. As a result, we've lost substantial revenue, but safety is our #1 priority, and we need proper staff available to offer the safety and quality you expect from us. If anything changes, we'll let you know!

8. "Getting fruit at lunch was continuously an issue."

- a. We have sliced fruit available for the campers most days- Assorted melons, pineapple, grapes, etc. If the counselor does not bring the fruit to the table, the campers (Sophs and older) are allowed to go get it themselves. We will make it a priority to do a better job of communicating this to our group staff and division leaders. Please contact your division leader if your child tells you this, and we'll designate them the "fruit deliverer of the table!"
- 9. "There are some camp traditions that new families might not know about, such as having friends sign their LLDC T-shirts on the last day... please do a better job of giving parents a head's up about these 'unspoken rules'"
 - a. Yes, we have lots of fun traditions, and they are almost too many to list... But at LLDC, we actually try to- It's called the <u>Liberty Laketionary</u>, and we send it to every new family, and post it on the Quicklinks webpage- updated every year. I just checked, and guess what- it does NOT say anything about the T-shirt signing tradition (damn!) I promise to add it for next year, thank you!

10. FROSH ONLY - "My son is a big sports fan, he would have loved to be able to sign up just for soccer or basketball, not just Frosh Multisport"

a. Unfortunately, when we had the individual sports listed on the elective sheet for Frosh (for almost 20 years), we had the problem of rarely getting enough kids to sign up for EACH of them individually to be able to run them at all. In order to run most sports, we need at least 8-10 kids, even more for baseball/softball. Multi-Sport allows us to get all the sporty 6-7 year olds together to run a variety of sports with them. That's why we do it that way. When they become Sophs, it's a bigger division, with more sporty kids, and we can pull it off successfully. It's something else we are keeping our eye on!

11. "Veggie burgers would be great at BBQ day"

a. Veggie burgers ARE available on BBQ day, and they are delicious. We have substitutes for most every entree- vegetarian, dairy-free, gluten-free. If you have any questions about substitutes, you can always contact our dietary specialist at food@libertylakedaycamp.com

12. "My child got the same electives two weeks in a row, which is annoying because he only attended for three weeks."

- a. If you don't change the selection and order of your child's electives each week, they may very well have the same electives given to them the next week. The elective "Top 15" list was not meant to be static- it was meant to be updated every week by Wednesday morning at 9am- unless your kid just LOVES their schedule and wants to keep them the same (it happens.) I strongly suggest making it a Sunday night tradition, or Monday, or Tuesday!
- 13. "My child did not feel comfortable changing with other people in the changing room, and I think he should have been allowed to change in a bathroom or somewhere else instead of wearing the same bathing suit all day long,"

- a. At Liberty Lake, very few of the campers actually "get changed" in the changing rooms. They come to camp in their bathing suits, and wear them throughout the day. If a camper or their parents want them to get changed, and they feel uncomfortable doing so in the changing room- first off, I hope that this is something that we can work on, like we do so many other things at camp-counselor can hold a towel up, etc. But if not, then yes- they can go to the bathroom or one of the extra changing tents we have, to get changed. PLEASE make sure that the division leader knows this, so that they can help the group staff facilitate this happening smoothly and discreetly- and if necessary, we'll include our Success Team to figure out how to best support your child.
- 14. "I gave 3s for communication because I really haven't gotten direct communication about my campers (just the group emails)----but honestly I think that is probably a good thing because it isn't necessary."

had taken any action."

- a. Yes, we agree :-) "No news, is good news + We'll call ya, when we need ya!"
 15. "My child got their Magic cards stolen or lost. While he (and we) understand that there is a risk in bringing them to camp, it was never made clear whether camp
 - a. Oy, these magic cards. I was very close to making the draconian decision to ban campers from bringing them into camp, but in speaking with the older campers who LIVE for it- it's just such a big part of the culture of Liberty Lake, that it would be very upsetting to them- more than replacing the bug juice with water! To be clear, we have camp-owned magic cards, and kids do not need to bring theirs to camp. When they do, and they disappear- We can not spend an inordinate amount of time acting like police detectives. We do our due diligence, asking the kids involved, and we notify the "magic staff" to look out for certain cards/boxes. But really, the best thing we can do is to continue to promote a culture of integrity, kindness, and respect. I am meeting with the magic card specialist next week, and will update our families if we update our policies.
- 16. "My kids had a hard time with the reward system of receiving fuzzies and beads due to their 'perceived behaviors' when the reality might be that their counselors or peers might not view them as such, which can be upsetting to the kids. Same with the rules of who receives a slushy- Who gets them? Who decrees them?" Are they a reward, or just birthdays? These items can be divisive, and a reward system doesn't seem to be needed at a place like camp- it's not school, so why set up 'competition' like this?" All should act and behave well, not rewarded for what should be considered basic expectations."
 - a. Terrific question, that I will be sure to go over in more detail during my pre-camp Parent Zooms. At Liberty Lake, we do our best to create a culture of kindness, love, and support, along the lines of our Star Points- and it doesn't just happen because we say so- it has taken a lot of intentionality. Last year, we put in a brand new system with different colored beads, so that the staff could be a lot more generous in giving them out, as the Fuzzies are meant for "bigger" more out of the ordinary acts of kindness. When the staff sees kids exhibiting the character traits of our star points, they are supposed to give out the beads. Last year was

- our first summer with this new initiative, so as you can imagine, some staff took to it better than others. It should be much better next summer. Fuzzies are given out in front of the entire division (or the camp on Friday afternoon) and are for the "Wow" moments that we want to tell everyone about. It can be argued that the beads are being given out for behaviors that we expect- but the fact is that many kids benefit from seeing others being rewarded for these behaviors. That said, we're always re-examining what we do, and are always seeking to improve.
- b. Slushies are mostly for birthdays, and all kids who return to camp get a mailed birthday card/slushy pass that they can cash in during the summer. Confusion is caused when the new campers do not have them (yet!) - which needs to be better explained, for sure (another one for the Laketionary, if it's not there already!)
- c. When I first became a camp director, 25 years ago, it was the time of "everyone gets a trophy" and we worked hard not to hurt anyone's feelings- you might say, to the detriment of society. Any time we reward people, we also run the risk of hurting other people's feelings- and while we do our best to mitigate it (like adding the beads this year), it's something that will happen to them for the rest of their lives. I give out a "staff of the week" for each division, every week of campand before I do it, I often explain how when I was a camp counselor, I NEVER won recognition at the camp I was at, and it legit infuriated me. One of my division leaders told me last week how she's still upset that she was never chosen to be a Color War general! There is an arbitrariness in life that often can't be avoided, unless we bubble wrap everybody. That said, we will continue to do our best to balance this, but as you can see at the bottom of this page- people LOVE our the values we preach and teach. Thanks again for this superb comment- by far my favorite!!!

17. "Snacks for the after-care kids- My kids were starving at the end of every day."

a. If this was Family Feud, this would be the #1 complaint from last summer. We will double our purchasing of pretzels and corn chips for this summer- I promise. Also know that we are very concerned about allergies at this time, since the kids are not with their normal counselors- limiting the choices we can give out. So, we have to stick with the bland and generic snacks. In all honesty, we may end up charging a fee for before/after care in 2025, like they do at school, that will enable us to have more programming, purchase better food for the kids, and not have to spread that cost over the 90% of families who do not utilize extended care.
