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1. Introduction (Times New Roman, 12 pt, Bold)

What is the purpose of the study? Why are you conducting the study? The main section of the article should start with an introductory section, which provides more details about the paper's purpose, motivation, research methods and findings. The introduction should be relatively nontechnical, yet clear enough for an informed reader to understand the manuscript's contribution. The contents of each section may be provided to understand easily about the paper. **80% referral is mandatory from journals, the remaining 20%**

can be from books, etc. from the last 10 th issue (for example, your manuscript will be published in 2026, then the max reference is published in 2016).

The “introduction” in the manuscript is important to demonstrate the motives of the research. It analyzes the empirical, theoretical and methodological issues in order to contribute to the extant literature. This introduction will be linked with the following parts, most noticeably the literature review. 2. Literature Review and Hypotheses Development (Quantitative) or Literature Review (Qualitative) (*Times New Roman, 12 pt, Bold*)

For **research with hypothesis testing**, the hypothesis development is built based on supporting theory, previous research, and logical reasoning. After the explanation is formulated, then write your hypothesis with this following format:

For **qualitative research (without hypothesis testing)**, then presented in this section is a literature review (theory and previous research and argumentation focused on research review). If necessary, research focus could be written in this part in the question form by the following format:

RQ: *write the problem that represents the research focus.*

3. Method (*Times New Roman, 12 pt, Bold*)

This section describes when the experiment has been performing. The researcher explains the experimental design, equipment, data collection methods, and types of control [the core content of this research method is more or less the same as in the thesis and dissertation, but the summary is not as complete as in the thesis and dissertation]. If the experiment is carried out in the field, the writer describes the research area, location, and also describes the work carried out. The general rule to remember is that this section should be detailed and precise so that the reader has the necessary knowledge and techniques for publication. The sequence is a type of research, reasons for taking at the location, data sources and informants, data collection techniques, data analysis, and checking the validity of the data carried out. This section, if possible, can be graphed for each research variable. Furthermore, the descriptive statistic value was presented (e.g., Mean, SD, Maximum, Minimum) with its interpretation. At the end of the section showed the hypothesis research result and its discussion completely. In the discussion part, highlights the rationale behind the result answering the question “why the result is so?” It shows the theories and the evidence from the results. The part does not just explain the figures but also deals with this deep analysis to cope with the gap that it is trying to solve. a. Table and Figure

Authors must provide high quality artwork for all illustrations. Poor resolution or definition is not acceptable. Each table or figure should be numerically numbered separately (Table 1, Table 2; Figure 1, Figure 2) and fully titled, which refers to the contents of the table or figure. Underneath each table and figure, state the reliable source. Use only horizontal lines, 1.5 spaced

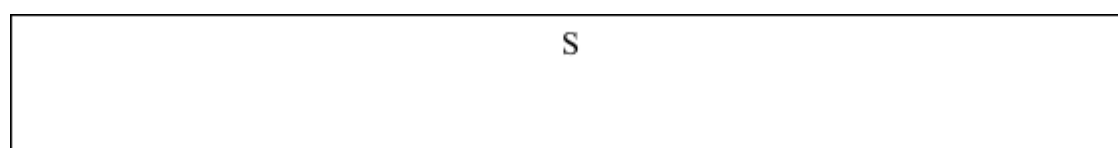

b. Equation

Equations should be numerically numbered consecutively in parentheses with aligning right margin, and it can use either the same font (Times New Roman) or the formula font.

5. Conclusion (*Times New Roman, 12 pt, Bold*)

In this section, the author presents brief conclusions from the results of the research with suggestions for advanced researchers or general readers. A conclusion may cover the main points of the paper, but do not replicate the abstract in the conclusion.

Authors should explain the empirical and theoretical benefits, the economic benefits, and the existence of any new findings. The author may present any major flaws and limitations of the study, which could reduce the validity of the writing, thus raising questions from the readers (whether, or in what way), the limits in the study may have affected the results and conclusions. Limitations require a critical judgment and interpretation of the impact of their research. 6. References (*Times New Roman, 12 pt, Bold*)

In this section, author (s) must list all the reference documents cited in the text. In writing the reference, the author(s) are recommended to use reference management tools, such as **Mendeley**. The citation and reference list should follow **the American Psychological Association (APA) 7th Edition** referencing style. Authors are encouraged to cite manuscripts primarily from primary source publications (journals) published within **the last 10 years** (2016–2026). Manuscripts must include **at least 20 reputable journal** articles relevant to the research topic. In addition, authors should avoid excessively referencing their own work (self-citation). A basic format to list the reference documents as follows:

- a. The reference list is arranged in alphabetical order by the authors' last names
- b. If there is more than one work by the same author, order them by publication date, oldest to newest.
- c. If there is no author the title moves to that position and the entry is alphabetized by the first significant word, excluding words such as "A" or "The". If the title is long, it may be shortened when citing in text.
- d. The first line of the reference list entry is left-hand justified, while all subsequent lines are consistently indented.
- e. Use "&" instead of "and" when listing multiple authors of a source.
- f. Capitalize only the first word of the title and of the subtitle, if there is one, plus any proper names – i. e. only those words that would normally be capitalized.
- g. Italicize the title of the book, the title of the journal/serial and the title of the web document.
- h. For any non-English articles, please write down the translation of the article in brackets [] after the original article's title. Note that the original article should be written in italics.
- i. Do not create separate lists for each type of information source.
