Introduction

Assessment is integral to the learning and teaching of students at St Joseph's Catholic High School. The goal of assessment is to enable teachers and students to gather evidence about student achievement and assist in the planning and implementation of teaching strategies to enable all students to be successful learners.

Assessment at St Joseph's Catholic High School may be either formal or informal. Formal tasks are those listed on the assessment schedule with a notification and must be designed to assess the outcomes identified for the task. All formal assessment tasks should be common across all relevant classes and marked in a way that provides consistent and reliable measures of achievement. Informal assessment is used to inform teachers about student's ability to meet the relevant stage outcomes.

The use of both formal and informal assessment provides information and data to staff members to allow for the evaluation of the effectiveness of teaching practices in the school community. It allows staff to support students in their learning and development.

Quality assessment assists students to become independent and self-directed learners. All assessment is standards referenced and students should have a clear understanding of what is expected of them.

All assessments, both formal and informal provide all students with an opportunity to demonstrate their achievement of course outcomes in a meaningful way and contribute to the finalisation of a students final grade at the end of each semester.

Students are encouraged to make every lesson count, challenge themselves to be engaged learners and do their best in every lesson.

1.0 Course Requirements

This handbook has been developed to provide students and parents with information regarding assessment for the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) Year 11 Course.

1.1 Course Completion Criteria

A student will be considered to have satisfactorily completed a course if, in the Principal's view, there is sufficient evidence that the student has:

- a) studied the course developed or endorsed by the NESA; and
- b) applied themselves with *diligence and sustained effort* to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school; and
- c) achieved some or all of the course outcomes.

1.2 Non-Completion of a Course

Students must provide sufficient evidence of course completion and achievement of course outcomes through the learning experiences provided by the teacher. This includes course work, assessment tasks, class discussions and preparation for lessons. Failure to provide such evidence may result in non-completion of a course. In such circumstances, students and their parents/carers will be notified through an official NESA Warning letter as part of the N Determination Process.

1.3 Non-Completion or Failure to Submit Assessment Tasks

If a student fails to complete an assessment task specified in the assessment schedule, without a valid and accepted reason (medical certificate or equivalent – documented via the school's Illness/Misadventure Form by a Medical Practitioner or other professional), a zero grade will be recorded for that task. In such circumstances, students will be notified through an official NESA Warning letter. It is a requirement that all tasks are completed and submitted to an appropriate standard (genuine attempt - refer to 5.2 Non Genuine Attempt At An Assessment Task).

1.4 Attendance Requirements

For the satisfactory completion of a course, a student's attendance at school is compulsory.

There are five main areas that need to be clarified with regard to absenteeism.

- a) All absences must be supported with an explanation from the parent/carer
- b) Where absence coincides with either;
 - I. The due date of an assessment task, or
 - II. The date an assessment task is to be held, or

- III. The day prior to an assessment task;
 - a medical certificate is required to substantiate the absence.
- a) Where a student's pattern of attendance interferes with their engagement with a substantial number of course outcomes, that student will be at risk of being awarded a non-completion for that course. A warning letter will be issued outlining the new requirements and a due date for outstanding work/tasks to be completed to ensure outcomes are satisfactorily met as outlined in the N Determination process.
- b) **Approved Leave:** This may be granted by the Principal. An *Exemption from Attendance Form* must be completed prior to the absence. Where leave is applied for during an Examination period, an interview with the student, their parent/carer and the Principal must take place. An Illness Misadventure Form must be submitted if an assessment task is scheduled or due during the approved leave. This must take place before the leave is taken.
- c) The School does not encourage leave to be taken during a student's Year 11 or HSC year.

If a student fails to meet the School requirements in one or more of the above outlined criteria, the N-Determination process will be implemented.

A student presenting for a Higher School Certificate MUST have satisfactorily completed the following:

- a) Year 10
- b) All My Own Work
- c) 12 units of Preliminary Courses that satisfy the NESA pattern of study requirements
- d) NESA Minimum Standards
- e) **10 units of HSC Courses** that satisfy the NESA pattern of study requirements that satisfy the NESA pattern of study requirements.

2 Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR)

The ATAR is SEPARATE from the HSC. It is a number, calculated by the Universities Admission Centre to assist universities in selecting students to undertake further study at the tertiary level.

The ATAR is OPTIONAL. You only require an ATAR if you intend to continue studies at a University. It is reported separately to the HSC and students not wishing to undertake further study at university do not have to apply for an ATAR.

The ATAR is calculated on a student's best 10 single units of Board Developed Courses (Category A and 2 units of Category B courses) of study. It must include:

- at least two units of English
- at least three courses of two unit value
- at least four subjects
- at most six units of courses in Science
- at least six units from Board Developed Courses including at least two units in Board Developed Courses in English

2.1 How to Maximise your ATAR

If you follow the suggestions below you will give yourself the best chance of maximising your ATAR.

- 1. Your HSC Examination result and school assessment are combined to determine your HSC result. Maximise your performance in **all** assessment tasks to ensure the highest possible ranking in each course you undertake.
- 2. Make sure you have an appropriate range of courses and units when you begin your HSC pattern of study.
- 3. Regardless of what courses you are undertaking you are capable of a high ranking by performing to the highest possible standard in each of those courses.
- 4. Have a consistent approach to study and completion of all homework and course tasks. Prioritise your study plan and do not over commit yourself to other activities.
- 5. Seek constant feedback from your teachers regarding areas where you can improve.

3 Pattern of Study

3.1 HSC Pattern of Study

Students not intending to continue their education at University/tertiary level will still attain their HSC by meeting all the NESA requirements of study, this being the successful completion of the NESA All My Own Work Course, Minimum Standards Tests, 12 Units of Preliminary Courses and 10 Units of HSC Courses. Students are required to sit their HSC Examinations and at the successful completion of these examinations, will receive their Higher School Certificate.

3.2 RoSA ONLY Pattern of Study

Students not intending to continue their education at University/tertiary level and who do not wish to sit their HSC Examinations can elect to follow a RoSA Pattern of Study. Students are required to meet all course requirements being the successful completion of 12 Units of Preliminary Courses and 10 Units of HSC Courses. Students electing this pattern will receive their RoSA transcript which is a record of their academic achievements in the courses studied from Years 10 to 12.

This pattern of study allows students to elect a mixture of Board Endorsed and Content Endorsed Courses.

4 Stage 6 Assessment Policy

Assessment Strategies are based on the course outcomes and weightings mandated by the NESA (NSW Education Standards Authority). Assessment tasks may take many forms eg: written examinations, research assignments, projects, presentations, practical or field work reports. The assessment tasks undertaken in each subject will help to determine what is to be recorded on a student's Record of School Achievement which is the official NESA certificate documenting a student's final results. Measuring achievement at various points throughout the course provides a better indication of student achievement across a broad range of course outcomes rather than a single examination.

Assessment

4.1 Assessment Task Notification

The assessment schedule for all Year 11 courses can be found in this handbook. In addition to this, students will receive an assessment notification for each task at least 2 weeks prior to submission/due date. The notification will include the following information:

- a) weighting
- b) outcomes formally assessed
- c) task type

- d) proposed timing and duration
- e) actual date and time of submission (eg: by 9 am Wednesday 11th June, 2025) to the Curriculum Office
- f) any specific requirements
- g) marking criteria
- h) feedback strategies

Any changes to the assessment schedule will be notified to students in writing. It is the student's responsibility to keep themselves informed about the timing of assessment tasks. It is the responsibility of the Leader of Learning and Class Teacher to ensure that all students receive relevant notification.

Assessment tasks, where practical, will not have a submission or completion date the week before or the week after a major examination period (ie; Yearly Examinations), <u>unless</u> no exam has been scheduled for the exam period in a particular subject.

Assessment tasks <u>can</u> be assigned over holiday periods permitting that the 10 days notification period is also provided for the task. Long-term major projects are completed throughout the whole assigned time period.

Where possible, assessment tasks will not be due the first day back after a holiday period, so that students are not disadvantaged.

4.2 Absence from School prior to an Assessment Task

Students who are absent from school/classes the day before or the morning of an assessment task may gain an unfair advantage. If a student is absent the day before or the morning of when a task is due the reason must be valid and justified. This includes the day before major exams blocks such as the Yearly Exam block.

The only exemption to being absent the morning of a task would be where a student has timetabled free periods.

The School may ask for an Illness/Misadventure Form or other supporting documentation. If the student has no valid reason for their absence the task still must be completed and the student will receive recognition of achievement of associated outcomes for the task. If the absence is due to illness or misadventure, an Illness/Misadventure Form must be completed.

4.3 Illness or Misadventure/Non-Submission

If, due to illness, misadventure or compassionate grounds a student either:

- a) misses an assessment task, or
- b) is unable to complete an assessment task by the due date, or
- c) is absent from school just prior to an assessment task being due or
- d) their performance in a task is affected or

e) is absent on the day an assessment task is due to be submitted.

The student <u>MUST</u> provide an Illness/Misadventure Form and appropriate documentation/evidence (eg. Medical Certificate) where applicable within 3 days of the date of the task to the Curriculum Office.

In the event of an absence on the day of an assessment task, a phone call to the school must be made to notify the school that you will not be attending your assessment. A completed Illness/Misadventure Form and supporting documentation must be submitted to the Curriculum Office within 3 days of the assessment task due date. The Curriculum Office will arrange for the task to be completed and where possible this may be on the first day back of attendance.

Every effort must be made to submit a task on the due date. If the submission is a hand-in task, it can be submitted to the Curriculum Office by a family member if you are too unwell to attend. If the task can be submitted electronically to your class teacher, then every effort should be made to do so. Failing this, the hand-in task must be submitted on the first day back to school.

Illness/Misadventure Forms are to be obtained from the Curriculum Office.

Submission Process

FORMAL TASKS YR 7-12

STEP 02

First day return to school

Students are to submit task to Teacher/LoL along with an I/M form with appropriate documentation by 9:00am on the first day they return to school.



STEP 03

4 days late

Class Teacher and LoL discuss nonsubmission with student and develop a completion support plan to submit task within the next 5 school days including after school learning support.



STEP 04

9 days late

LoL and Curriculum Coordinator to meet with student and possibly parents/carers to discuss non-submission, review the matter and evaluate non-submission and resolution process.



STEP 01

Before submission

Task out as early as possible (minimum 2 weeks before due date)

Day of submission

Teacher records whether task is submitted in Compass, informs LoL of students that have not submitted task, Compass SMS sent to those students and parents

4.4 Principles of Assessment

Assessment is the process of collecting evidence of student learning in order to provide information about a student's knowledge, skills and understanding of the learning outcomes specified in the NSW Syllabuses. The fundamental purpose of assessment is to improve student learning.

4.5 Number and Value of Tasks

NESA and the Catholic Education Office, Diocese of Wollongong require a maximum of three formal tasks for a course. Each course will have an assessment schedule based on the mandatory weightings and components and requirements for individual courses.

An individual task will not normally be worth less than 10%, nor more than 40%, of the total assessment marks. One task may address several course outcomes. In general, later tasks will carry more weight and measure more outcomes than earlier tasks.

4.6 School-Based Assessment - Year 11 Courses

In Year 11, students will complete school-based assessments to determine their final grade in each subject.

Assessment in Year 11 MUST be based on **Mandatory Weightings and Components** as set out in the Syllabuses for each HSC course being studied. Each task is linked to syllabus outcomes and students are given the opportunity to demonstrate their level of achievement of the outcomes. Values and attitudes are NOT measured.

Assessment tasks allow students to show what *they know, understand and can do* in ways that may not be possible in a written examination. Tasks may include research projects, portfolios, performances, oral presentations, essays and extended responses, tests and examinations, practical investigations, experiments and fieldwork to name a few. The nature of tasks varies from subject to subject.

Students must follow the principles set out in HSC: All My Own Work and make a genuine and serious attempt in all tasks. Formal Assessment Tasks MUST be completed and submitted by published due dates. A ZERO result will be given for all non-submitted Assessment Tasks. Students will have access to an Illness and Misadventure process to cover genuine illness and misadventure which results in late submission. This procedure is further explained on page eight.

At the end of each course, and based on a combination of formal and informal assessment, the school will submit to NESA a ROSA grade for each student in each Board Developed Course (Except VET and Life Skills Courses). This grade is then allocated to the students RoSA.

4.7 Year 11 Grades

NESA has developed a set of general performance descriptors that describe grades A to E as five levels of achievement. The following table gives an indication of how these help to assess a student's performance across all elements of each course.

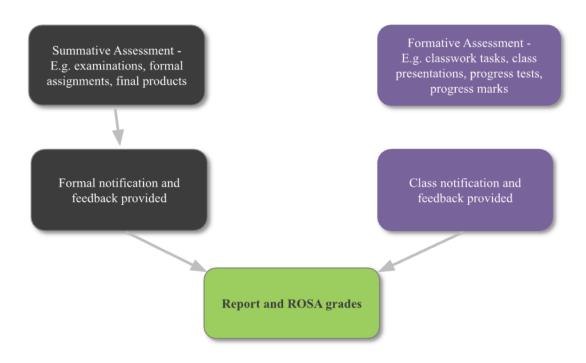
The student demonstrates extensive knowledge of content and understanding of course concepts, and applies highly developed skills and processes in a wide variety of contexts. In addition the student demonstrates creative and critical thinking skills using perceptive analysis and evaluation. The student effectively communicates complex ideas and information. The student demonstrates thorough knowledge of content and understanding of В course concepts, and applies well-developed skills and processes in a variety of contexts. In addition the student demonstrates creative and critical thinking skills using analysis and evaluation. The student clearly communicates complex ideas and information. C The student demonstrates sound knowledge of content and understanding of course concepts, and applies skills and processes in a range of familiar contexts. In addition the student demonstrates skills in selecting and integrating information and communicates relevant ideas in an appropriate manner. D The student demonstrates a basic knowledge of content and understanding of course concepts, and applies skills and processes in some familiar contexts. In addition the student demonstrates skills in selecting and using information and communicates ideas in a descriptive manner. Ε student demonstrates an elementary knowledge of content and understanding of course concepts, and applies some skills and processes with guidance. In addition the student demonstrates elementary skills in recounting information and communicating ideas.

4.8 Determining Grades in Each Course

Your Learning Advisors will use both summative and formative tasks to determine your achievement and your grade in each course. In both types of assessment, your Learning Advisor is looking for evidence of your achievement across a range of outcomes. Your Learning Advisor will use their professional judgment to determine your grade in each assessment task. They will compare your work with criteria and samples provided by NESA. When these assessments are combined, your achievement in the tasks will form the basis of your ROSA grade at the end of the Year 11 course.

4.9 Monitoring Student Performance

Student performance will be monitored through the listed assessments, through informal class tasks and through Class Teacher interaction with students. Monitoring of student progress will be used to provide feedback to students and to inform teaching.



4.10 Recording Student Performance

Student performance in listed assessments will be digitally recorded using Compass. Student results will be determined based on standards-referenced levels of achievement in the listed formal tasks. At the end of the Yr 11 course, the Leader of Learning - Curriculum will be responsible for recording results onto the NESA Schools Online website.

4.11 Reporting on Grades

You will be provided with a Progress Report early in the second term based on your assessments during the first part of the year. You will also be issued a Final Year 11 Report that will indicate your grades for each of the courses you attempted. If you decide not to continue to the HSC year, your ROSA will reflect your efforts in the Year 11 course. If you do continue to the HSC, your Year 11 grades will form part of your HSC report from NESA.

5 Failure to Meet Assessment Requirements

5.1 Implications of Late or Missed Assessment Task

If an assessment task is missed or handed in late without a valid reason it may be awarded a zero grade. The assessment task must still be submitted so that the student can receive recognition of achievement of associated outcomes for the task.

5.2 Non-genuine attempt at an Assessment Task

If a student does not make a genuine attempt in an assessment task, a zero grade may be awarded and an N Warning letter may be issued. A non-genuine attempt is where a student writes irrelevant or inappropriate comments or fails to seriously address the task.

5.3 Malpractice

All work presented in assessment tasks must be the student's own work or be acknowledged appropriately with reference to the source or author. Malpractice is taken very seriously as it enables students to gain an advantage over other students which is unfair and inequitable.

Malpractice can include, but is not limited to

- copying someone else's work in part or in whole, and presenting it as your own
- using material directly from books, journals, CDs or the internet without reference to the source
- building on the ideas of another person without reference to the source
- buying, stealing or borrowing another person's work and presenting it as your own
- submitting work that another person, such as a parent, friend, tutor or subject expert, has contributed to substantially
- using words, ideas, designs or the work of others in practical and performance tasks
- without appropriate acknowledgement
- paying someone to write or prepare material
- breaching school examination rules
- cheating in a school-based task, such as a test or exam
- cheating in the HSC examination
- using non-approved aids during an assessment task
- contriving false explanations to explain work not handed in by the due date
- faking an illness or injury to prevent the completion or submission of work
- unauthorised use of AI; and/or
- assisting another student to engage in malpractice

5.4 Malpractice Procedures

If malpractice is suspected, the teacher must inform the appropriate Leader of Learning. The Course teacher will provide the Leader of Learning evidence to support the malpractice (e.g., the internet page copied, other student work that is the same, etc.). The Leader of Learning and Teacher will determine the extent of the malpractice.

In cases where malpractice is suspected or has been proven the following procedures will be applied:

- The student, parent/carer will be informed (verbally or in writing) by the Teacher and/or Leader of Learning and be presented with the evidence.
- An 'N' Warning letter will be generated by the Leader of Learning to officially inform the student/parent/carer of the malpractice and what the student needs to do to redeem the 'N' Warning letter.
- The student will be given the opportunity to present any evidence or information to support their position (drafts of work, witness statements, etc) to the Teacher and/or Leader of Learning.
- Notes/records of any discussions/interviews will be taken and kept securely.
- Confidentiality will be maintained at all times by all parties.
- The student will be informed of their right of appeal and the appeal process. Appeals must be lodged to the Leader of Learning - Curriculum within 48 hours of verbal/written notification of an incidence of malpractice.

5.5 Consequences of Malpractice

Proven malpractice may impact a students ROSA grade.

One or more of the following consequences may be applied to proven malpractice:

- reduced grade for all or part of the assessment task
- zero grade for part or all of the assessment task
- an N Warning letter sent to the student/parent/Carer; and/or
- withdrawal from a course/s.

5.6 Appeal against Malpractice

After being informed of the consequence of proven Malpractice, students have 48 hours to appeal a decision made by the KLA Leader of Learning to the Leader of Learning - Curriculum.

The Leader of Learning - Curriculum will review the evidence and inform the student, parent/carer of their decision verbally or in writing. Notes of any discussion/interview must be made and retained.

If the student, parent/carer is not satisfied with the decision of their appeal to the Leader of Learning - Curriculum a final appeal can be made to the Principal. This appeal MUST be made within 48 hours of being informed of the Leader of Learning - Curriculum's decision. The appeal must be made to the Principal in writing and any new evidence provided. The Principal's decision will be final.

5.7 Invalid/Unreliable Tasks

In exceptionally rare circumstances, often due to situations and circumstances beyond the control of the school, formal assessment tasks may be deemed invalid or unreliable. In these cases, students will be informed in writing and one or more of the following will occur where appropriate:

- only part of the task will be marked
- the weighting of the task may be reduced, and additional weighting added to a future task; and/or
- a new task and due date will be issued
- an updated assessment schedule will be issued.

6 Student Appeals Process

Students have the right to appeal the decision of a Leader of Learning in relation to any individual task.

All appeals over an individual task must be resolved at the time the task is returned.

- i) The student must discuss the matter with the relevant teacher/Leader of Learning upon completion of the task, or, immediately upon returning to school following the absence.
- ii) An Assessment Appeal Form must be handed to the Leader of Learning Curriculum within three school days of return of the Assessment Task
- iii) The student will be invited to meet with the Appeals Panel to explain their case. Attendance before the appeals panel is optional.
- iv) The Appeals Panel will be chaired by the Curriculum Coordinator and consist of
 - 1) the Principal (or their nominated representative)
 - 2) two independent Leaders of Learning.
- 3) A student can nominate a support person to attend eg. one parent, independent teacher eg. PAL if they wish. This must be indicated in writing to the Curriculum Office ideally 24hrs before the Appeal Panel convenes.

The Appeals Panel will be convened within 5 school days of receiving an Appeal.

- v) The Appeals Panel will inform the student in writing of the outcome of their Appeal within 5 school days of the Panel meeting.
- vi) All decisions of the Appeals Panel will be final.

If malpractice is suspected, the teacher must inform the appropriate Leader of Learning. The Course teacher will provide the Leader of Learning evidence to support the malpractice (e.g., the internet page copied, other

7 Assessment Feedback

Students will be given feedback on how well they have performed on each assessment task. This can take the form of grades, teacher comments, description of the competencies achieved by the student, description of what was not achieved or areas that may need improvement. The type of assessment task conducted will determine the nature of the feedback.

A student can only query the grade awarded by a teacher for an individual assessment task at the time the task is returned.

8 Course Completion

8.1 Satisfactory Completion of Course

Students will be considered to have satisfactorily completed the subject being attempted if there is sufficient evidence that they have applied themselves with diligence and sustained effort to all set tasks; this includes both Assessment and Non-Assessment Tasks. They must also have achieved some or all of the course outcomes.

8.2 N-Determination Process

A student, who fails to make a genuine attempt to complete course work (through classwork and attendance in class) and/or who fails to complete formal and informal assessment tasks will be deemed as not satisfactorily completing the course.

If it appears that a student is at risk of not meeting the assessment or attendance requirements in a course, a warning will be given. In this case:

- the Leader of Learning Curriculum will be informed by the relevant Leader of Learning
- the student will be advised, in writing, in time for the problem to be corrected
- the student is required to provide written acknowledgment of the warning
- the warning notice will be copied and retained in the student's file
- the student's parent(s) or guardian(s) will be advised.

A student who fails to satisfactorily complete a course will have an "N" determination will be awarded.

This decision will be made by the Senior Review Committee who will meet and discern the "N" determinations for students at risk. The committee is made up of the Curriculum Coordinator and two Leaders of Learning who are not linked to the faculties involved in the "N" determination process. The Principal will be advised of the committee's decision.

Students may appeal the decision with the Principal and/or the NESA.

9.0 VET Courses

9.1 Assessment in VET and Work Placement

As with all other Year 11 courses, students undertaking VET courses may be deemed to have either completed or not completed course requirements.

Assessment of all students in VET Courses is competency based. Demonstrating competence means that you can perform the task or show an understanding to the level required by the industry standards. When you successfully demonstrate your competence against a particular standard you will be judged as "competent". There is no pass/fail. You are either "competent" or "not yet competent".

The units of competency you achieve will be recognised on a vocational qualification. Your school reports will contain an on-going record of your achievements.

Most VET courses include a requirement of work placement. These hours support the demonstration of course competencies in an industry setting. Completion of these is a requirement of these courses.

9.2 Workplace Readiness

Students will be prepared for their work placement by their VET Teacher. You will receive a *Student's/Parent's Guide to Workplace Learning* booklet, which will give the necessary information such as responsibilities of the student, child protection legislation, accidents and insurance, safety, confidentiality, and other matters. In addition, your course will be designed so that you cover important knowledge and skills (such as WH&S) prior to your work placement.

St Joseph's Catholic High School also run a work readiness program including completing activities on www.go2workplacement.com and undergoing a workshop with our work placement provider.

It should be noted that if a student fails to undertake any mandatory work placement component it may be determined that the student has not made a genuine attempt to complete course requirements. In this case the Principal can indicate that the course has not been satisfactorily completed and the student may be issued with an 'N' determination.

It is a student's responsibility to see each of their teachers prior to commencing work placement regarding course work and upcoming assessment tasks which need to be complete before returning to school. If a student misses an assessment task whilst on work placement an Illness Misadventure must be submitted.
