- I. Call to order and attendance
 - A. Meeting began at 9:03 am.
- II. Discussion items:
 - A. Campus Updates President Cant
 - 1. Not present
 - B. Human Resources updates and discussion Joe Housenick
 - 1. Discussed summer hours at board meeting
 - a) Will continue as last year two options just like last year
 - 2. Working on seeking a new VP of Finance and Operations Search
 - a) Partnered with a company for assistance
 - b) Hoping to have the position filled by June
 - 3. Lunch & Learn is Mental Health and Wellbeing
 - a) March 11th

 - a) More discussion needed toward survey ideas
 - C. Executive Actions Presentation Elizabeth Leo
 - Board met last week and a lot of discussion regarding changes at the federal level and how it might affect Wilkes
 - 2. Approx 10 orders that affect higher ed, mostly surrounding immigration, DEI, funding and gender identity
 - 3. DEI
 - a) Two separate orders implemented 1/20 and 1/21
 - (1) Currently subject to injunction
 - (2) For the moment, there is no enforcement due to this
 - (3) Some universities already removed DEI clubs/etc but Wilkes has not at this time unless it becomes required by federal law at some point in the future
 - (4) At this time, seems as though DEI programs and affiliation groups are safe, and that support for DEI on campus will be

permitted. Matter making its way through the courts - more to come.

- (5) Lots of constitutional legal issues to be decided
- b) Titles like first-gen students remain permissive because it is race neutralgoes across all races, ethnicities etc.
- c) No changes needed to curriculum at this point will only become necessary if required by law constitutional challenges continue
- 4. Federal Funding and DOGE
 - a) There will be increased focus on grant funding
 - b) Any grant with DEI wording will likely be under scrutiny
 - c) DOGE has requested wide-spread access to Department of Education data, but they were denied as of now
- 5. Immigration
 - a) Can affect campus and community
 - b) Universities, churches and hospitals are no longer safe havens, so ICE is technically legally allowed to enter campus to seek illegal immigrants
 - c) If they did show up, they would likely check in with public safety so there would be some sort of knowledge when/if they arrive
 - d) If ICE is seen, all campus members are instructed to tell them to report to Public Safety as buildings are private property and they cannot enter unless invited in
- 6. Gender identity and expression and Sexual orientation
 - a) Reversion of Title IX regulations to 2020 regs should not affect our campus as we have anti-discrimination laws and policies in place already to protect those who fall under this category
 - b) Our policies protect our students from discrimination will not change no matter what Title IX includes in its scope
- 7. Elizabeth Leo offered to attend any meeting or groups that would like her to speak on any of these issues for open communication
- 8. If the Department of Education was dismantled today, what would happen?
 - a) Likely won't happen, would get caught up in courts
 - b) Another agency would take over enforcement arm
 - c) Likely nothing would change for us in terms of Title IX implementation and enforcement
- 9. As far as "any college that allows illegal protests" goes, what does that mean for us?
 - a) Too vague hard to comply
 - b) What is an "illegal protest"? Protests are protected by the first amendment so what would that even mean? Only exceptions to free speech (ie violence or inciting violence) could render a protest illegal
 - c) Free speech, after all, is protected
