

Consider the Ketchup Bottle

1 Peter 3:13-22

Ketchup. We put it on burgers, fries, hot dogs, and eggs. My wife even puts it on her macaroni and cheese. Good stuff – but it wasn't always so good!

Before H.J. Heinz started making ketchup and putting it in glass bottles, pouring ketchup on anything could be dangerous. In 1866, ketchup was, according to cookbook author Pierre Blot, "Filthy, decomposed and putrid." A short tomato growing season, coupled with carelessness, lack of clean storage, generally unsanitary conditions, and the addition of highly flammable coal tar to the mix to enhance the red color, all combined to make ketchup a potentially lethal concoction.

In 1876, the Pittsburgh visionary Henry J. Heinz bottled his first batch of tomato ketchup. Heinz was a morally strong man who believed that "heart power is better than horsepower," and worked hard at developing a safe environment and process for ketchup to be produced in a way that was pure, enjoyable – and transparent.

His factory was spotless. His workers were encouraged to be meticulous about cleanliness, and Heinz rewarded them with fresh uniforms, free laundry, free life insurance and health care, athletic facilities, a swimming pool and even an in-house manicurist to make sure that every worker's nails were immaculate.

The result was a perfect environment for making a ketchup that would not only *not kill you*, it was so good that it became a staple on American dinner tables for the next two centuries!

Heinz was so focused on purity and transparency that he refused to bottle his ketchup in the opaque brown bottles that were common at the time, choosing instead to use clear glass bottles as a way of demonstrating the product's purity to the public. Heinz even opened his factory to 30,000 visitors per year so they could see that the company had nothing to hide. By 1906, Heinz was selling five million bottles of preservative-free ketchup every year, and chances are that the next transparent bottle of ketchup you reach for today still has the Heinz label on it.

Henry Heinz built a lasting legacy based on transparency, earning the trust of consumers because he focused on purity and quality and hid nothing from them. That clear, quality bottle of ketchup, whether it's the traditional glass design or the squeeze bottle, is still something that people trust well enough to take for granted. The transparent character of H.J. Heinz is still reflected in every one of his products, even after his death in May of 1919.

Heinz made ketchup, but he was even more concerned about making the world a better place. Are we as "eager to do good," as Peter puts it? (v. 13). Are we living lives that are equally transparent, "doing what is right" no matter what it might cost us? (v. 14). Peter offers us some advice on how to live the Christian life in such a way that everyone who sees us will know exactly what's inside.

Peter is writing to churches in Asia Minor who are undergoing a great period of distress and persecution for their faith. Their environment stinks worse than fermented fish guts, and they're suffering in a world where the hidden agendas and filthy tactics of their opponents are leading to suffering and death for the Christian Community. Rather than retaliate or turn up their noses at this situation, Peter encourages the churches to live lives of purity amid their suffering, "keeping a clear conscience so that those who speak maliciously against your good behavior in Christ may be ashamed of their slander" (v. 16). Indeed, Peter says, "even if you should suffer for what is right, you are blessed" (v. 14). The real test of the Christian life is the ability to stay pure and transparent, even when others are trying to dump the spiritual equivalent of toxic coal tar into your life. Suffering is inevitable in the Christian life, but the way we react to it makes all the difference. Rev. Bob

Communion Sunday

*Genesis 1:1-2:4a; *Psalm 8; 2 Corinthians 13:11-13; Matthew 28:16-20

Sermon Title: "In Awe of the God Who is Mindful of Us"

What are humans that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them? -- Psalm 8:4

I hope you could hear, as I read the Creation Narrative as it is presented in Eugene Peterson's *The Message* the hymnic quality of the narrative. I can't tell you that the ancient Hebrews sang this narrative rather than read it as I just did. What I can tell you is that upon reading it for the very first time in *The Message*, that fantastic possibility crossed my mind! The narrative is poetic with the refrains, traditionally rendered:

Altar Color: White

"God spoke ... and it was so."

"God saw what He had made and it was good."

"There was evening and there was morning."

Creation appears and comes to life as this beautiful song runs through its days. Indeed, it is good!

Then we reach the sixth day, the final day, and the crowning moment.

"Let us make humans in our own image."

And behold, it was so. Man, woman, boys, girls, people of every size, shape, and gender – siblings everyone – united as children of the awesome God of Creation.

Wow! Be amazed at the wonder of it all!

Light and dark, sun, moon, and stars, land and sea, the sky above, birds, fish, animals of every kind – and who bears the mark, the divine image – the humans!

Who are we? Just who are we that God would be mindful of us?

I want to tread lightly here: Perhaps, just perhaps our Psalmist is asking the wrong question. Maybe the question is not, "Who are we that God is mindful of us?" Maybe the better question, especially on Trinity Sunday is, "Who is *God* that God is mindful of us?"

On Trinity Sunday, we celebrate how we know God and this gives us clues to figure out who God is that God is mindful of us.

Our awesome God is:

The Father who created us and reaches out toward us in everlasting love.

The Son who came to be among us to show us how to live and give himself to reconcile us with the Father and one another.

The Holy Spirit who teaches us, who fills us with the love of God, and ever dwells within and among us, God's presence with us.

Who is God that God is mindful of us? God is the Father who loves us, the Son who gave himself for us, and the Spirit who fills us and is with us always.

Sunday, June 11, 2023 The Second Sunday After Pentecost Altar Color: Green

*Genesis 12:1-9; Psalm 33:1-12; Romans 4:13-25; *Matthew 9:9-13, 18-26

Sermon Title: "A Call into the Unknown"

June and July are big months for weddings. I have had the honor of officiating many marriages – and standing before my own mom and dad administering the Vows of Marriage to them as they renewed their wedding vows before friends and family on their Golden Anniversary.

A beautiful picture of them was on display at that party. My father's friend took the picture. It looks as if he composed it to resemble the cover picture on the movie cast album of the sound track from the film "South Pacific". They are sitting on a large boulder, holding each other close, eyes locked, smiles on their faces.

Both are so young! Mom is gorgeous! Dad is handsome and fit!

Like every young couple, they are ready! They are ready to launch into their life together. Their hearts are filled with optimism and hope! Their whole lives are before them! Theirs would surely be a wonderful story, filled with love and laughter and blessing!

A few days later, they were married – and a grand adventure began!

The couple who stood before me fifty years later, experienced much love and laughter and blessing! They also endured more than their fair share of sorrow. You can't have blessing without pain, you can't have laughter without tears, nor can you have love without grief.

The call to discipleship is like mom and dad in that old photograph, or any young couple in love embarking on a life of love and commitment together. It is a call into the unknown!

Mom and dad had no idea what was ahead ... no young couple does. They just move ahead ... optimistic ... trusting ... trusting each other ... trusting God ... trusting the future. Maybe they are a little naïve, but in this case naivete might be a good thing!

Abram is called. "Go... to a land I will show you... I will bless you and I will make you a blessing." That's it! What Abram leaves is much clearer: Home... kindred... land... country... everything he has ever known. And—he goes!

Matthew is called. "Follow me," the man said. That's it. Nothing else. No explanation. And—Matthew goes!

What are they thinking! They are moving into an unknown and unknowable future. The promise of blessing to Abram would be fulfilled – but the going would be hard. It would be a mixed bag. And this discipleship journey for Matthew – he left a cushy job to follow an itinerant rabbi?! He would have a front row seat to see Jesus' miracles, hear his teachings, and be with him in times of table fellowship with the least and the last. He would also be with Jesus in those tragic final days. And then – the glorious Resurrection and the beginnings of the Church.

And our call to discipleship? "Come, follow me." That's all we get. God asks us to leave our old life behind – like Abram – and follow Christ into an unknown new life of challenge and blessing. Christ asks us to leave behind our old vocation, our self-centered focus on material gain, our desire for fame and fortune into an unknown and unknowable future. That future will be a blessing beyond compare, sprinkled with worldly trials and difficulties.

The path of discipleship is a step into the unknown. Like a couple preparing to declare vows of eternal commitment one to the other, we can't know the future. Also like that same couple, we step out into that future with optimism and trust, believing that the blessings will outweigh the sorrows.

Sunday, June 18, 2023 **The Third Sunday After Pentecost** Altar Color: Green Father's Day

*Genesis 18:1-15, 21:1-7; Psalm 116:1-2, 12-19; Romans 5:1-8; *Matthew 9:35-10:8 Sermon Title: "The Child Called 'Laughter'"

God called to Abraham, "Go ... to the land I will show you. I will make of you a Great Nation."

As we saw last week, Abraham went. He believed God's promise. He trusted in God's guidance.

Abraham went. His feet moved in obedience to his faith. He moved his wife, his entire household, and himself in accordance with God's command. Abraham trusted the Lord and it was accredited to him as righteousness.

Problem. If he was to be a Great Nation, why was he childless?

Here was the faith struggle he and Sarah dealt with as they traveled to "the land the Lord would show him." Sarah was barren.

Abraham's given name was Abram, which means, "Exalted Father." His given name revealed his destiny. Sarah was barren. When he doubted, the Lord gave him a new name, the name we more commonly use for him: Abraham, "the father of many nations." This name re-affirmed Abraham's destiny and God's sacred promise. Sarah was barren.

Abraham was faithful. Yet—well into old age, at a time when most people are cuddling great grandchildren, Abraham was childless.

Abraham and Sarah waited long for the promise to be fulfilled. When the three men appeared and announced that Sarah would have a son "in due season", Sarah laughed.

"Impossible! This can't happen to an elderly person like me!"

She laughed. How could such a wonderful thing take place?

In due time, the impossible happened. The loins of the elderly made seed. The womb of the elderly bore a child. The child born in due time was called "Isaac" which means "Laugher".

God made the impossible possible. Sarah became a mother. Abraham became a father. And they named the child "Laughter"

This laughter is not the laughter of comedy, it is the laughter of surprise. It is the laughter of amazement over the unexpected fulfillment of a dream long forgotten. It is a giggle of awe over a precious, newborn child. It is the laughter of thanksgiving because a prayer has been answered: God has brought healing; God has made the way forward plain; God has provided for the need; God has comforted in grief.

Laughter. God does great things, and we laugh.

According to Luke, Jesus called the Twelve together. In this passage he calls them "Apostles" because they are about to be sent.

Sent to do what? They were sent to do exactly what he did. And when Jesus did them, people laughed with amazement.

How were they to do it? Jesus gave them the authority. That's it. They had the authority. That's all the resources they needed to do great things in his name. They did those great things and the people laughed in amazement.

And we—we are called to do great things in his name. We have the authority and the resources to do those things. So we shall go – and the world will laugh as they see Christ working in us and through us.

Sunday, June 25, 2023 **The Fourth Sunday After Pentecost** Altar Color: Green *Genesis 21:8-21; Psalm 86:1-10, 16-17; *Romans 6:1b-11; Matthew 10:24-39 Sermon Title: "Alive to God"

The Book of Genesis, Paul in the Epistle to the Romans – they both emphasize the faith of Abraham. Genesis lifts him up as a Patriarch and a hero. Paul in Romans sees him as an exemplar of the faith Christian believers should strive to emulate. We are not saved by works, but our works surely show where our faith lies. Abraham is an example of this. So says Paul in the Epistle to the Romans. So says the Book of Genesis.

Now we come to Genesis chapter twenty – one, just after we read of the long-sought fulfilment of God's promise of child named "Laughter", Abraham casts Haggar and Ishmael (his son by her) into the desert. Did we read this right – Abraham, at Sarah's behest and with what he understood to be God's blessing cast Haggar – Sarah's servant and Abraham's secondary wife and the son born of the union of Haggar and Abraham into the hot, dry desert to die? Did we read this right? Abraham – our faith hero – our faith example cast Haggar and Ishmael into the desert with a couple day's supplies, most likely to die in the desert? Scary story!

This terrible act is the conclusion of a series of faithless acts on the part of Abraham and Sarah. I suspect that they wanted to believe that God would make good on giving them a son through Sarah, but as the years passed, it was harder and harder to believe.

"God didn't say that the child would literally come from my womb," reasoned Sarah. Abraham agreed. It was the custom in the middle east in that day for the child born of the union between a woman's servant and a woman's husband was counted as that woman's child.

They chose to believe that this was God's plan. Abraham and Haggar came together.

A child was conceived. Ishmael.

Things were tense in the household with the two women and the one son. When Isaac was born, the tension level in the house went through the roof! Sarah would not tolerate her son sharing his inheritance with the child of a servant-girl. No way!

Sin multiplied many times. The casting out of Haggar was the final step. How will he overcome? Sin is like a snowball rolling down a long, steep hill – it grows and grows until it is out of control. How do we overcome sin's power?

One man: Jesus. Paul says our sin is taken away. It is buried.

Christ bore our sins on the tree (the cross). He died and was buried. Our sin was buried with him. Christ didn't stay dead; he rose to new life. Our sins stayed buried. Christ offers new, redeemed life now to us.

Baptism is the perfect metaphor: Standing in Baptismal Waters, we are washed of our sin, under the waters we are buried with Christ. Rising out of the waters we are given new life.

In some traditions, an infant is not named until baptism, announcing to the world Christ's claim on the child as his precious daughter, his beloved son.

In some traditions, an adult who is baptized receives a new name, symbolizing the work of transformation God has begun in the newly baptized one.

We are God's children. Christ has claimed us. We are being transformed. The Spirit of Christ began his work with in us long ago and will carry it forward to completion.

Like Sarah, like Abraham, our faith lapses. Sin grabs hold of us. Its effects multiply, damaging others around us. The good news is that Christ has claimed us and filled us with his spirit. We are being transformed. Sin's power is broken.




