- Curriculum Vitae (CV) or resume
- Interview with faculty (if required)

Practicum Requirements:

- A minimum of 200 hours of supervised field experience.
- Submission of a comprehensive practicum report detailing experiences and learning outcomes.
- Participation in academic conferences, publishing projects, or literary workshops.
- Completion of a final presentation summarizing practicum experiences.

Master's Thesis Requirements

The Master's thesis is a critical component of the program, requiring students to conduct original research in literary studies. The thesis must demonstrate advanced critical thinking, thorough literary analysis, and academic writing proficiency.

Students must complete the following steps:

- Develop a research proposal approved by faculty advisors.
- Conduct an in-depth literature review relevant to their topic.
- Analyze literary texts using established and emerging critical theories.
- Write a comprehensive thesis (minimum 50 pages) following academic guidelines.
- Successfully defend their thesis before a faculty committee.
