Interlochen Health and Rehabilitation Center has had no new cases of COVID-19 in the last 7 days.

We are open for visitation.

We are thrilled to share a few updates we have made to our COVID-19 Response Plan. Today, there is a much lower risk of spread and severe illness from COVID-19 and because of this, new guidelines released last week by the CDC have allowed us to make the changes outlined below.

Masking requirements will now be determined by our county transmission rate.

When our county has a transmission level classified as anything below "high" (low, moderate, or substantial) all staff and visitors, vaccinated and unvaccinated, will have the option to remove their face coverings inside our building.

This policy is subject to change and masks will be required again if:

- Our county community transmission level is "high" or
- We have a new staff or resident case of COVID-19 within the last 14 days

The county transmission rate is updated frequently on the CDC's website. Meaning, the county level, and our face covering policy, could change overnight.

Signage will be posted on our door, and throughout the building, to reflect the current requirements. You may always call to ask about our current guidelines prior to your visit. Even when optional, we will always have masks available for you to use. Visitors may remove face coverings in private settings with their loved one, regardless of the current county transmission rate.

All visitors must screen in by answering a series of questions about symptoms and contact on our kiosk. Visitors must record their temperature and use hand hygiene before and after their visit. We ask that visitors do maintain physical distance from anyone outside of their immediate group.

As always, our first priority is the health, safety, and comfort of our residents. We will continue to observe numerous core principles of COVID-19 infection prevention.
