This October 23 - 31, celebrate Red Ribbon Week. Red Ribbon Week spreads awareness on the dangers of bullying, drug use, and tobacco. Teaching kids good habits early is critical to future success. Celebrating Red Ribbon Week shows kids that living above the influence is the best way to live a happy life.

Red Ribbon Week teaches kids that the best weapon in the fight against bullying, cyber bullying, drugs, and tobacco is other children. When kids see other kids being mistreated, they should not be afraid to tell an adult. In schools and on playgrounds, there is no better pair of eyes, than those of their peers. Vigilant kids can go a long way in protecting their friends.



October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. If you are a woman over 40, take this opportunity to schedule your annual mammogram.

If you're a woman of any age and are at high risk for developing breast cancer, talk to your doctor about when you should start genetic

screening, mammograms and risk reducing strategies, such as medications that may reduce your risk of developing breast cancer.

Mammography has great potential to save lives. Tell your mothers, sisters, daughters and friends to schedule their annual mammograms today.

Breast cancer treatment depends on the stage of the disease, and may include surgery, radiation treatment, chemotherapy or hormone therapy. Discuss treatment options with your doctor.

There is good news in the fight against breast cancer. Breast cancer deaths continue to decline, thanks to increased awareness and early detection through regular screening. Research has shown that breast cancer screening with mammography has been found to detect cancer early, when it is most treatable.

How can National Breast Cancer Awareness Month make a difference? We can use this opportunity to spread the word about important steps women can take to stay healthy.

Here are just a few ideas:

- * Ask doctors and nurses to speak to women about the importance of getting screened for breast cancer.
- * Encourage women age 40 and older to talk with their doctors about when to start getting mammograms.
- * Talk with women ages 50 to 74 in your community about getting mammograms every 2 years.

Open door angles

Doors in your house are the perfect place for hands-on practice with angles. Take turns opening or closing a door and asking, “Acute, right, or obtuse?” Partially open a door, and it’s an acute

angle. Open it straight out, and it's a right angle. Open it wider, and it's obtuse.
