NUR 766: Care Transitions/Interprofessional Practice: Child/Adolescent

Credits: 3

Prerequisites and/or co-requisites: NUR 760, NUR 762, NUR 764

Description:

This course provides theoretical foundations for management of acute and critical health dysfunctions of children and adolescents, and related family needs, across the acute care health care delivery system.

Objectives:

At the end of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Integrate theories and evidence-based practices in designing advanced nursing strategies for the target population.
2. Identify elements of effective negotiation and appropriate consultation skills in assessment of the primary care needs of children/adolescents.
3. Discuss concepts guiding selection of actions or roles of the advanced practice nurse (APN) in management of health pattern alterations of children/adolescents.
4. Refine strategies for documentation and measurement of the APN effectiveness in teaching coaching, consultation, advocacy, and system influence in providing primary health care to children and adolescents
5. Discuss selection and utilization of technology supportive of the adaptation of children/adolescents to alterations in their health patterns, considering economic and geographic factors affecting efficiency of the technology for individual clients, their families, and the health care system.

Instructional Methods:

This is a computer enhanced learning or hybrid online class with 5 face- to-face meetings. In addition, this class also requires participation in online assignments with regularly scheduled readings indicated and available on Blackboard. The weekly modules include reading assignments/activities with due dates and links to relative sites as warranted. Online activities require each person to assume responsibility for their own learning as well as contribute ideas to the class. For this 3-credit hybrid course, expect to spend 9-11 hours each week reading, doing assignments, and/or participating in

dialogue through classroom discussion or posting on discussion boards. This course and all associated readings and activities are designed to promote introspection through self-guided learning as well as foster interactions among class members.

Class Participation: Students should be engaged, present, and prepared in order to receive full participation scores. Please keep your telephones off/silenced during class time. Computers are to be used for course work only. If you are absent for any class or miss an online learning activity, it is your responsibility to notify the faculty prior to the start of class. Failure to notify faculty prior to the start of class will result in zero points for participation/class engagement for that week. Use of phones/internet for reasons not related to coursework during class will also result in zero points for that week.

Online Class Assignments: Each week there will be materials posted under “weekly modules” for you to review. This will include readings, videos, and other media. Throughout the semester there will be associated assignments that correspond with our learning activities. These will be posted in Blackboard in the weekly modules folder for the corresponding weeks. The grading criteria for the online learning activities will be posted as a rubric in Blackboard with the instructions for the assignment. Class assignments are expected to be carried through to the clinical setting.

Technology Requirements and Help:

Access to the GVSU Blackboard is required. Students are responsible for any and all documents, assignments, and messages posted on the Blackboard site and checking the Bb site frequently. Contents of topic folders will be made available to students 2 weeks prior. We will use Blackboard as our class environment. The class specific technologies will be accessible there. If you choose to use other technologies for any of the assignments, please alert us ahead of time.

You will need to be able to open PDF files and can find links to download this from the “Online Orientation” (<http://www.gvsu.edu/online>) or from the GVSU IT website. Also from the orientation website, you will find information on the self-directed Blackboard Orientation and links to additional Help documents. The standard GVSU word processing program is Word, and that is what we will use. Word documents in the course site are posted as .docx. If this is not compatible with what you have access to, please let me know. We prefer documents submitted to us as Word documents, and will not accept incompatible programs (if you are unsure, please save your document as rich text format (.rtf) or send us a “test” document to make sure that we are compatible. Contact me if you have any questions or concerns.

When you first login to our Blackboard course site, you will enter your dashboard which will show announcements, due dates, that will update you on class times etc. On a regular basis, you will access the areas called “Simulations”, “Assignments”, etc. Once you have reviewed the course site orientation, let me know if you have questions. Please post general questions on the discussion board.

Methods of Evaluation: Assignments in this course will align/supplement with your co-requisite theory course.

All criteria and grading rubrics are available on Blackboard. Content and expectations will be reviewed in detail on the first day of class.

Faculty-Student Communication:

A clear faculty-student communication strategy is essential at all times. Faculty and students are expected to communicate between in-class meetings via blackboard and email. All official GVSU email goes to your student (Gmail) account, including any email sent from Blackboard. Email will be sent through Blackboard, so it is very important that you check your GVSU Gmail account on a regular basis. Many times, reminders, tips and general FYI information will be sent as an e-mail message. Likewise, it is expected that you check our Blackboard class site on a regular basis (4+ times per week).

Email sent from Blackboard includes the course number. When sending an email message that does not originate in Blackboard, please indicate the course number in the subject line and sign your name within the body of the message, so that we know with whom we are corresponding. If it is an urgent message, please also include the words "help" in the subject line. Based on the sheer volume of email we receive every day, this will help us to give priority to urgent messages from students.

During the workweek (Monday-Friday) I check my email several times between the hours of 9a-5p. You will receive a response within 24-hours (and usually much quicker). Faculty will respond within 24 hours unless you are notified that they will not be available. If you do not receive a response, please email a second time and/or contact Dr. Quick (269-808-2367) directly. I often check email at least once during the weekend, and reserve the right to limit email access. Therefore, please do not expect that I will return email messages on the weekend. Depending on when you send your message, it may be Monday before you hear back from me.

Please consider the **Three Before Me** rule, where before emailing me concerning technical questions or other class logistics (due dates, assignment clarification, and the like), try learning your answer through three other means first:

Professional Conduct:

Subsequent incidences of unprofessional communication or behavior will result in negative consequences for the student that may include a required meeting with college administration (Associate Dean, Dean), a referral for remediation, and/or a reduction of the student's final grade.

Netiquette:

Although many of us have experience with email, online discussion is different because we're communicating "one to many" rather than "one to one." Therefore, it's important that we maintain a sense of freedom to express our thoughts while at the same time providing a safe atmosphere for that expression. Please keep this in mind as you are communicating with others.

All participants should maintain a professional attitude and manner of discussion. While spirited debate is encouraged, unprofessional behavior is not tolerated. Often times, words often come across "more directly and harshly" in this

written form of communication, since there are no facial gestures, expression or tone of voice to help convey your message fully. Your contributions should not be overly negative or personal in nature.
