Goosebumps

When we're cold, watch a scary movie, or listen to our favorite song, we might get little bumps all over our skin.

The bumps are called goosebumps; they are tiny muscles on our body that <u>tighten</u> our hair and make it stand <u>upright</u>. These bumps are an **involuntary** response to intense emotions.

Goosebumps have a practical purpose for animals. When an animal's hair sticks up, it makes the animal look bigger and helps protect it against <u>predators</u>. A raised layer of fur can also help keep an animal warm when cold. According to experts, goosebumps aren't a <u>survival</u> reaction for humans. They are the result of an **adrenaline** rush sparked by an extreme emotion.

adrenaline (a hormone that the body makes from fear, anger, or excitement).
