### Writing Complete Sentences

#### Terms:

- **Subject** who or what the sentence is about.
- Predicate tells about the subject

#### Complete sentence structure.

- Complete sentences include a *subject* and a <u>predicate</u>; however, there are some exceptions.
- A complete sentence is a complete thought.

#### **Complete sentence examples:**

- Grammar is often a challenging aspect of English. (subject) (predicate)
- Capitalization and spelling errors are common writing problems.
  (subject) (predicate)
- There were *three errors* in her sentence. (*subject*) (predicate)

#### Exceptions (commands and requests):

- Practice writing skills to improve communication.
  Note that the subject is assumed to be *you*. (predicate)
- <u>Help me with my sentence structure</u>. **Note** that the subject is assumed to be *you*. (predicate)
- Is *this* your paragraph? (Find the subject when the sentence is rewritten). *This* is your paragraph.

**Sentence fragments** may appear when the first word is a subordinator (if, when, because, since, after, although, unless).
