Writing Complete Sentences

Terms:

- **Subject** - who or what the sentence is about.
- Predicate - tells about the subject

Complete sentence structure.

- Complete sentences include a **subject** and a predicate; however, there are some exceptions.
- A complete sentence is a complete thought.

Complete sentence examples:

- Grammar is often a challenging aspect of English.
(*subject*) (predicate)
- Capitalization and spelling errors are common writing problems.
(*subject*) (predicate)
- There were three errors in her sentence.
(*subject*) (predicate)

Exceptions (commands and requests):

- Practice writing skills to improve communication.
Note that the subject is assumed to be *you*. (predicate)
- Help me with my sentence structure. **Note** that the subject is assumed to be *you*.
(predicate)
- Is *this* your paragraph? (Find the subject when the sentence is rewritten).
This is your paragraph.

Sentence fragments may appear when the first word is a subordinator (if, when, because, since, after, although, unless).
