## **Predictions for Changes in General Church Leadership**

**Presidency of the Seventy:** Possible release of 1-3 current members, depending on unknown factors.

**Note:** Since 2018, there have been 8 changes in the membership of the Presidency of the Seventy. 5 of those 8 changes were presented and ratified during the April General Conference before becoming effective on August 1, and 3 of those 5 were nowhere near 70 at the time of their releases. Although I do not necessarily anticipate such a change this time around, it seems wiser to allow for the potential thereof. Those most likely to be called are any whose service started between 2006 and 2018<sup>1</sup>.

**Result:** No changes.

General Authority Seventies: With a few recent exceptions, most new GA Seventies have been sustained during each April General Conference. Past precedent indicates that any new GA Seventies may be called from among the current or former area seventies, current or former members of the Sunday School and/or Young Men General Presidencies, any current or former mission or temple presidency member, any current or former stake presidency members, or from the Church at large.

**Result:** Elders Ahmad S. Corbitt, Robert W. Daines, J. Kimo Esplin, Christophe G. Giraud-Carrier, and Alan T. Phillips were sustained as new GA Seventies. The Church also noted the release of Elders Benjamin De Hoyos, Juan A. Uceda, and Kazuhiko Yamashita as GA Seventies and that they will be designated as emeritus GA Seventies effective August 1.

**Area Seventies:** Typically, the April General Conference sees only a few area seventies released. As per the new tradition established last year, any changes in area seventies will be presented in the General Conference leadership Sessions, with those changes ratified as a group during the Saturday Afternoon Session of General Conference.

**Result:** The Church sustained 61 new area seventies and announced the release of 50 others to be effective on or before August 1, 2023.

**Young Women General Presidency:** General President Sister Bonnie H. Cordon and her respective First and Second Counselors, Sisters Michelle D. Craig and Rebecca L. Craven released; new Young Women General President and counselors called; changes to be effective August 1.

**Result:** The current Young Women General Presidency was released. The new Young Women General Presidency will be Sisters Emily B. Freeman, Tamara W. Runia, and Andrea M. Spannaus, effective August 1.

**Relief Society and Primary General Presidencies:** Potential changes could be made if either of the counselors in those two presidencies is called to serve as the new Young Women General President.

**Result:** No changes were made to either presidency.

**Sunday School and Young Men General Presidencies:** There is always a possibility that any current members of the Sunday School or Young Men General Presidencies could be sustained

as new GA Seventies. If that happens, new members of the affected presidency (or presidencies) would be called.

**Result:** With Elder Ahmad S. Corbitt called as a GA Seventy, Brother Bradley R. (Brad) Wilcox succeeded him ass First Counselor in the Young Men General Presidency, and Michael T. Nelson succeeds Brother Wilcox as Second Counselor, effective immediately.
