<u>Course Description</u>: In this course, students will learn about significant events in early American history and the causes and effects of these events. This course of study will begin with the *First English Colonies* (1605) and end at the *Reconstruction* period, post Civil War (1877).

Classroom Policies and Procedures:

Grades: As per the BMS handbook, student grades are weighted as such:

- ✓ 70% is based on performance in common assessments
- ✓ 30% is based on performance on daily work assignments

The grading scale is:

90-100% = A; 80-89% = B; 70-79% = C; 60-69% = D; below 59% = F.

Students who do not submit assessments or fail to complete an assessment satisfactorily will be expected to complete the assessment before or after school and/or during lunch. Students are also able to retake their assessments.

Daily Work Assignment and Assessment Guidelines:

- 1. Daily work assignments & assessments are considered late if submitted after the teacher's established due date.
- 2. The highest grade a student may earn on a daily work assignment and/or an assessment submitted after the teacher's established due date will be a 70%.
- 3. If needed, you are welcome to retake tests for a better grade. Make arrangements with Mr. de Peyer to do this.

<u>Starters:</u> The beginning of each class will be dedicated to our starter assignment. As per the whole school expectation, all students must be seated at their desks at time of the second bell and be working on the starter. These daily starters may

cover any of the following topics: Review of previous lessons, States, Presidents, This Day in American History, American Culture, Pop Culture and/or Current Events.

<u>Web-Based Lessons:</u> Much of our curriculum incorporates digital tools for interactive learning. This includes our online textbook, internet research, online modules, historical simulations, and digital field trips. If you miss a digital lesson you may be required to complete it at home. If internet or chromebook access is unavailable you may be required to complete an alternative assignment. You will need earbuds in my class. They're to be brought to every class.

Research Project: During semester 1 you'll complete a research project about a famous American of your choosing (one who lived during the time period we study). The written and oral piece of the project will both receive an assessment grade. The research component will be a daily grade.

Homework: Occasionally homework will be assigned. Unfinished class work or work that has been missed due to an absence is to be completed for homework. If you need additional time please arrange this with Mr. de Peyer

<u>Hall Pass/Restroom Policy</u>: Students are expected to use the bathroom during passing time and during class with approval from the teacher. You can use the pass to use the restroom or get a drink. Each pass is worth only 5 minutes and students must be back in that time period. A separate pass will be issued for other needs, such as the counseling office, nurse, or office. Passes may not be used within the first 10 minutes or the last 10 minutes of class.

<u>Duty Unavailability</u>: I have duty before/after school on Tuesday from 7:25am-7:40am/3:03-3:18pm. I am unavailable during this time.

<u>Remind</u>: I will be using the app "*Remind*" to connect the classroom to parents and students (in addition to other traditional communication modes).

A note from me:

We cover a lot of content this year but we have a ton of fun doing it. Students seem to have a great time in my room but I do have clear expectations and procedures that need to be followed. We will go over these on the first days of school and I will also give you a copy of these to take with you.

Every day I look to see that all students are giving their best and I try to create an atmosphere that is inviting, entertaining, and conducive to the learning process. Participation is imperative to your success in my room too. Work hard to find a way you can be an active member of the class. If Social Studies has never been your favorite subject, I challenge you to come in this year with an open mind.
