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Course Information:

Description

This course immerses students in meaningful communicative and intercultural contexts, reinforcing and expanding, both orally and in writing, the structures introduced in the first two years of Spanish. It is designed to increase proficiency from novice mid/high to intermediate high. The units foster a sense of community among students, encouraging risk-taking and collaboration. Topics are relevant and centered on themes that immerse students in the cultures of Spanish-speaking communities. Activities and assessments incorporate authentic sources and real-life cultural contexts, promoting student choice and providing opportunities to demonstrate what learners can do in the language. In addition, students will read a series of short stories, watch a telenovela series, and view feature films in Spanish.

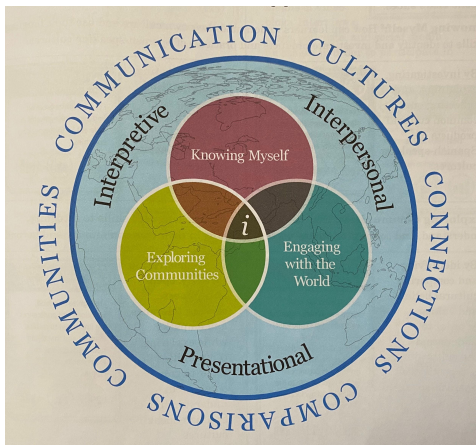
Format

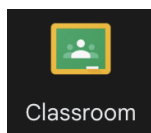

Student Expectations, Attendance and Engagement:

Attendance and Engagement:

Academic Honesty

Honesty is a compelling principle by which we operate all aspects of student and school life. Academic honesty is highly valued at BHS. Students should not cheat or plagiarize, nor should they tolerate such among fellow students. **Students do not receive credit for work that is not their own.** Cheating is defined as an attempt to earn credit or receive a grade for coursework in a manner other than defined as acceptable by the teacher. Plagiarism is the taking of language, ideas or thoughts from another person or resource without acknowledging the source. Students who use plagiarized papers or projects or are involved in any other form of cheating will be subject to reduction in grades and/or disciplinary action. Because of the serious nature of academic honesty, violations of this code may result in loss of credit for the assignment with a recorded failing grade. It may also entail loss of credit for the course with a recorded failing grade, removal from the course with a failing grade, and/ or additional appropriate disciplinary action. Do your best to speak Spanish as much as possible. The more you use the language, the easier it will become.

- **Participation:** Engage fully in all class activities, in person or online. If absent, contact the teacher in advance to arrange alternatives.

- **Translation Tools:** Online translators (e.g., Google Translate) are not allowed.
- **Electronic Dictionaries:** May be used only to look up specific words, which must be cited. All work should reflect your own knowledge.
- Approved Resource: [WordReference](#) is permitted.

★ **Summative assessments (75% of final grade):**

- ☐ **Interpretive (INT):** Learners understand, interpret, and analyze what is heard, read, or viewed on a variety of topics.
- ☐ **Presentational (PRE):** Learners present information, concepts, and ideas to inform, explain, persuade, and narrate on a variety of topics using appropriate media and adapting to various audiences of listeners, readers or viewers.
- ☐ **Interpersonal (INP):** Learners interact and negotiate meaning in spoken, signed, or written conversations to share information, reactions, feelings, and opinions.

★ **Retakes:** Will only be given in case of illness or special circumstances on a case by case.

★ **Formative assessments (15% of final grade):** [Practice]: This category records student completion and/or performance on homework, classwork and in class participation.

★ **Final exam (10% of final grade):** Accumulative, multiple choice.

★ **Extra Credit:** Per World Languages Department policy, **extra credit is not offered.**

Submitting Assignments:

- All assignments must be legible and submitted via Google Classroom or in person, depending on the assignment, by the specified due date and time. Submitting blank documents or no documents at all will not be accepted, and no credit will be given.

- **Students are responsible for checking Google Classroom regularly for homework assignments and links to helpful resources.**
- To succeed in this course, assignments should be in their final draft form and **submitted on time, unless the student has made prior arrangements for an extension.**
- A one-week grace period will be provided for most homework assignments. Assignments submitted after this grace period may receive only partial credit, up to a maximum of 80%.
- Homework will **not** be accepted more than one week after the end of the unit.
- *When an answer key is available, students are expected to review and correct their assignments using the provided key.*
- **If a student is unwell, they should email the instructor to discuss a new due date.**

Assessments:

- Unit exams will be administered approximately every three weeks.
- Before each exam, students will receive a study guide. The day before the exam, a practice exam will also be provided to help students prepare. To receive full credit for the practice exam (which will be recorded in Skyward as a homework assignment), *students must score 70% or higher*. Students can retake the practice exam to improve their score before taking the actual exam.
- Each exam will include the following sections: unit vocabulary, grammar, reading comprehension, cultural knowledge, and a writing prompt.
- In addition to unit exams, students will take listening comprehension quizzes periodically throughout the semester.
- On exam days, students will use their Chromebooks. Therefore, it is essential that students bring a fully charged Chromebook and charger to class on those days.
- If a student is absent on the day of the exam, they must make arrangements to make up the exam as soon as possible. Exams must be completed within one week of the original exam date.
