Lola Pellicer

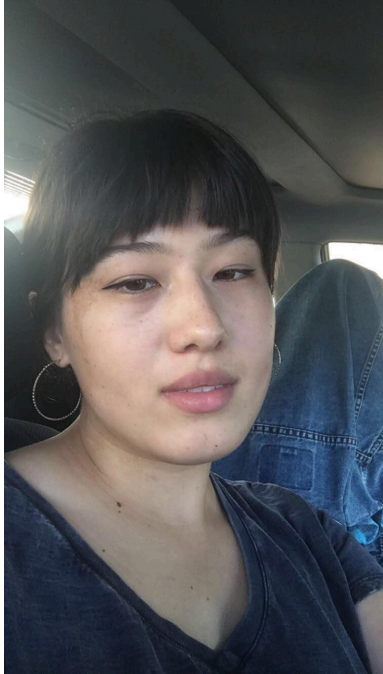

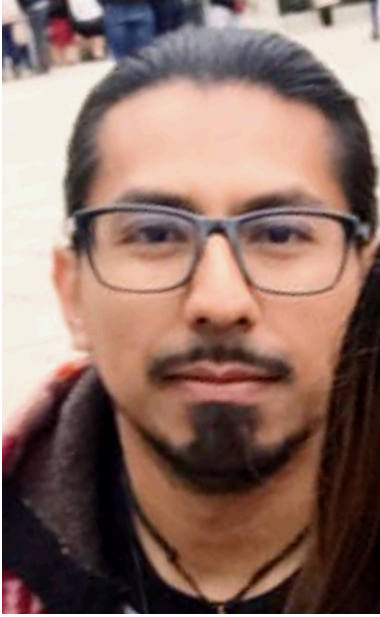
Alfredo Martinez
