Materials and Preparation:

- KWL and anchor chart from previous lesson
- Internet and device to show digital materials

Key Vocabulary:

Vocabulary slides (17-21)

Appropriate: a good choice

Decisions: a choice that earns a consequence either positive or negative

Inappropriate: a bad choice

Introduction (5 mins):

Review the KWL chart and anchor chart from the previous lesson and discuss prior knowledge.

Explicit Instruction/Teacher Modeling (5 mins):

Review school and classroom expectations and consequences.

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Guided Practice (10 mins):

Model choosing a situation by using the <u>Teacher Sequencing Cards</u> or coming up with a different scenario. Model writing about the situation and whether the choice made was appropriate or inappropriate.

Independent Work Time (15 mins):

There are 3 different activities to provide a choice board for students.

Printable: Appropriate and Inappropriate Behavior

Differentiation:

K: Use the sequencing pictures to determine appropriate and inappropriate behaviors and discuss with small groups.

1st: Students will write a sentence to match the sequencing pictures telling what behavior is appropriate or inappropriate.

2nd: Students will come up with their own situations to write about.

Assessment (10 mins):

Use the Printable: Appropriate and Inappropriate Behavior from Independent Work Time.

Review and Close (5 mins):

Have a few students share their writing and discuss new knowledge learned.

Optional Activities:

The teacher can call out different situations and students can give a thumbs up if the behavior was appropriate or a thumbs down if the behavior was inappropriate.

Intervention/Support:

Create social stories with students by taking videos of appropriate and inappropriate behaviors or photos to create a book for students to review. These videos can be shared with different classes or the school to review expectations.

Enrichment/Extension:

Students create a Flipgrid (requires account) or google slide for students to read their writing.

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Teacher Reflection:

To Ask with Students:

If we do this again, what can I do differently to help you learn more?

Did this activity help you learn more than others we've done? Why?

Classroom Culture:

Are the relationships that I have with my students helping or hindering their ability to learn?

Could the problems I have in my classroom be solved by pre-teaching my expectations or developing rules/procedures to deal with these issues?

Was my demeanor and attitude toward my class today effective for student learning?

What choices have I given my students lately?

Can I explain at least *SOMETHING* about each of my students' personal lives?

Curriculum and Instruction - Assessment and Grading Practices:

Do my assessments really reflect learning or merely task completion or memorization skills?

What evidence do I have that my students are learning?

What new strategies have I tried lately with a student who is struggling?

In what ways do I challenge students who are clearly being successful in my classroom?

Collaboration - Professional Learning Community:

In what areas can I still improve professionally?

Do my actions as a teacher show my belief that all students can learn at high levels?

Do my actions as a teacher show that I take pride in my work?

Are the relationships I have with my colleagues conducive to creating a collaborative culture focused on learning?

Are the relationships I have with my students' parents conducive to improving learning?

Mental Health – Maintain a Healthy Outlook:

What new ideas have I tried in my classroom lately to keep myself energized about teaching?

What have I done lately to relieve stress and focus on my own mental health, to ensure I remain an effective teacher?
