# OSHKOSH MARINE IS BLOWN FROM FOXHOLE DURING IWO JIMA FIGHT

After fighting on the Iwo Jima front lines for 10 days with the Fourth marine division, Pvt. Robert Lincoln, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Lincoln, 7 King street, was blown out of his foxhole on the 11th day and wounded.

In a letter received directly from him, the parents were informed the son was now on another island, recuperating. The extent of his injury was not disclosed but was believed not to be serious as the letter was written by the Oshkoch youth himself.

Private Lincoln said he survived 10 days of the toughest fighting in the war and on the 11th day Japanese mortar shells had "blown him out of the foxhole."

He also stated he would send more information about his wounds in a later letter.
