**Abstract**

Abstract consists of 100-300 words which should be written in one paragraph. It should be concise, clear, descriptive, and comprehensive. It should provide a brief overview of the article and reasons for the selection or the importance of the topic (background), purposes, and a summary of the result and analysis or the conclusion. For a research-based article, it should briefly explain the research questions and methodology.

UJLC accepts two types of manuscript: **Conceptual Paper** and **Research Article**. Both types of manuscript should consist of 3 sections, namely: **Introduction**, **Result and Analysis**, and **Conclusion**. Authors must properly cite each material that is not common knowledge (nor Authors' personal opinion) throughout each section, except the Conclusion. In doing

so, UJLC requires footnotes instead of bodynotes.¹ Authors to also note that each paragraph should comprise of minimum 3 (three) sentences.

1. INTRODUCTION

This section should focus on introductory aspects that will navigate the readers into the specific scope of the manuscript. For **Conceptual Paper**, this section should elaborate the background, purpose(s) of the writing, as well as literature review. For **Research Article**, it should elaborate the background, specific research questions, literature review, as well as research methodology. UJLC encourages a literature review that reflects the state-of-the-art from similar previous studies in order to prove, or as a basis, that the research has new and important academic contribution.

2. RESULT AND ANALYSIS

For **Conceptual Paper**, this section should elaborate the inquiries that lead to achieving such purpose(s). Analysis of the **Conceptual Paper** should explore and develop theoretical frameworks or conceptual advancements. For **Research Article**, this section should presents research findings and elaborates its content primarily by answering specific research question(s). Analysis of the **Research Article** may be presented either qualitatively or quantitatively, or the combination of both, in line with research method.

Both **Conceptual Paper** and **Research Article** should follow academic principles and show consistency with the relevant academic discipline. Analysis should be conducted by focusing on the legal aspects (legal principles, norms, theories, and concepts), as well as relevant legal interpretation techniques. This section may be further divided into sub-sections and sub sub-sections.

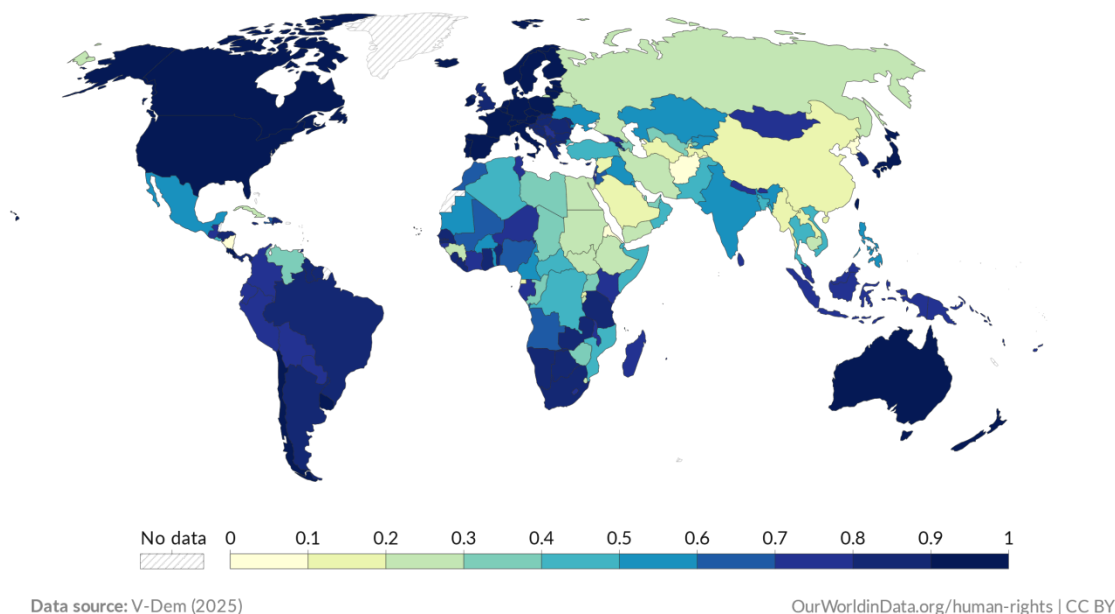
❖ Figures

Figures can be diagrams, schemes, or images, with a high resolution of at least 300 DPI (Dots Per Inch). Especially for images, Authors are responsible in ensuring that all images used are legally permitted (owned by the Authors/in the public domain/licensed to Authors/licensed for free academic use) for journal article publication. Each figure should be followed with a clear source(s), preferably cited in the figure's title. Here is an example of the use of a figure:

3. CONCLUSION

This section should be written concisely in no more than one paragraph. **Conceptual Paper**'s conclusion should highlight on the proposed concepts and **Research Article**'s conclusion should capture the results of the research. However, both should not merely present as a summary of the **Result and Analysis**. Author(s) may also provide recommendation(s) to relevant audiences, i.e., government, academics, and/or segmented communities. Moreover, the conclusion should not introduce new concepts that are absent throughout the discussion, and should not contain any citations.

BIBLIOGRAPHY

Bibliography should contain all cited sources and materials throughout the manuscript, which are sorted alphabetically based on the Author names. Literatures used should prioritize recent publications, i.e., preferably within the last 10 years. UJLC encourages the citation of relevant academic journal articles (min. 20 journal articles), preferably those from reputable journals (Scopus-indexed) and those that are originally written in English. The manuscript is encouraged to apply automatic citing tools (e.g., Mendeley, EndNote, Zotero, etc). Bibliographic citation should be made in accordance with the following order:
