TEXT USE

Use a teacher-approved copy of the complete 22-chapter novel. This resource supplies original prompts and no reproduced passages.

How to Use This Packet

This packet helps readers test the novel's 1944 setting against reliable historical evidence. Each file supplies context, an investigation task, and a transfer question. Complete files when they illuminate the current reading mission; do not front-load every fact.

Historical thinking mission

Determine which parts of the novel are historically grounded, which are plausible inventions, and how the author transforms real places into story.

Investigation Rules

- Observe before interpreting.
- Record creator, date, source type, audience, and purpose.
- Distinguish source evidence from inference.
- Corroborate important claims.
- Cite the source link and access date.
- Use historical difference to deepen—not merely fact-check—the novel.

File 1: Lower Manhattan in 1944

Context

The novel's neighborhood sits within dense networks of homes, schools, markets, restaurants, docks, transit, ethnic communities, and public landmarks. Distance on a map does not equal ease of travel, safety, or social access.

Map Investigation

1. Locate the Lower East Side, Battery, Castle Clinton, Fulton Fish Market/South Street, Empire State Building, Brooklyn Navy Yard, Statue of Liberty, and Coney Island.
2. Estimate walking or transit relationships; label water boundaries and bridges/tunnels.
3. Mark spaces connected to food, work, government, recreation, shelter, and memory.

Systems Question

How does the city's physical arrangement make the siblings both vulnerable and resourceful?

File 2: World War II Home Front

By 1944, families in the United States were living with military separation, rationing, war work, casualty news, scrap drives, bond campaigns, and uncertainty. The home front was not separate from the war; households changed consumption, labor, communication, and routines.

Evidence Categories

File 3: Castle Clinton

Castle Clinton began as an early nineteenth-century harbor fort, later served entertainment and immigration functions, and became the New York Aquarium in 1896. The aquarium closed in 1941 amid plans connected to a Brooklyn–Battery crossing. The structure faced demolition, but wartime conditions and preservation efforts shaped its survival.

Evidence Trail

4. Create a four-stage timeline: fort, entertainment/immigration, aquarium, threatened demolition/preservation.
5. Compare a pre-1941 aquarium image with a 1940s image or plan.
6. Identify what Dory could plausibly encounter in 1944 and what belonged to an earlier or later period.

File 4: Fulton Fish Market

The Fulton Fish Market operated in Lower Manhattan from the early nineteenth century until its move to the Bronx in the twenty-first century. It was a wholesale system shaped by docks, streets, merchants, workers, restaurants, transportation, early hours, and perishable goods.

How does the novel turn an economic network into a network of care? What might that transformation simplify?

File 5: Housing, Age & Informal Care

The Byrne siblings' situation raises historical questions about rent, landlord authority, minors' legal vulnerability, child welfare, privacy, neighborhood knowledge, and informal caregiving. Laws and practices varied; avoid assuming that a modern procedure operated identically in 1944.

Inquiry Questions

- What authority could a landlord exercise over tenants?
- What agencies or charitable organizations addressed child welfare?
- How might older siblings and neighbors provide informal care?
- Which risks would make families hide their circumstances?

Legal-history caution

Do not state a precise 1944 rule unless a New York source from the relevant period confirms it. The novel's threat can be analyzed without inventing legal certainty.

File 6: Food, Rationing & Mutual Aid

Food in the novel is material evidence: it reveals rationing, work, money, ethnicity, routine, generosity, pride, and the difference between receiving help openly and hiding need.

File 7: Recreation During Wartime

The Empire State Building, movie theaters, school dances, and Coney Island create spaces for wonder and ordinary childhood. Recreation did not mean that families forgot the war; it could provide relief, social connection, fundraising, newsreels, memory, or painful contrast.

File 8: Service, Letters & Public Symbols

Families displayed symbols of military service, waited for letters, followed incomplete news, and interpreted ships, uniforms, flags, and harbor activity through private hope and fear.

Evidence Questions

- What did a service flag communicate publicly?
- What information could wartime letters include or omit?
- How did censorship, delay, and uncertainty shape family interpretation?
- Why might a harbor become a place of both evidence and projection?

Reliability Questions

- Who created it, when, and for whom?
- Is it primary, secondary, institutional, commercial, or user-generated?
- Does it show, describe, interpret, persuade, or sell?
- What other source corroborates it?
- What remains unknown?

Best-source rule

Prefer museums, archives, government historical sites, libraries, scholarly institutions, and clearly documented collections. A polished webpage is not automatically reliable.
