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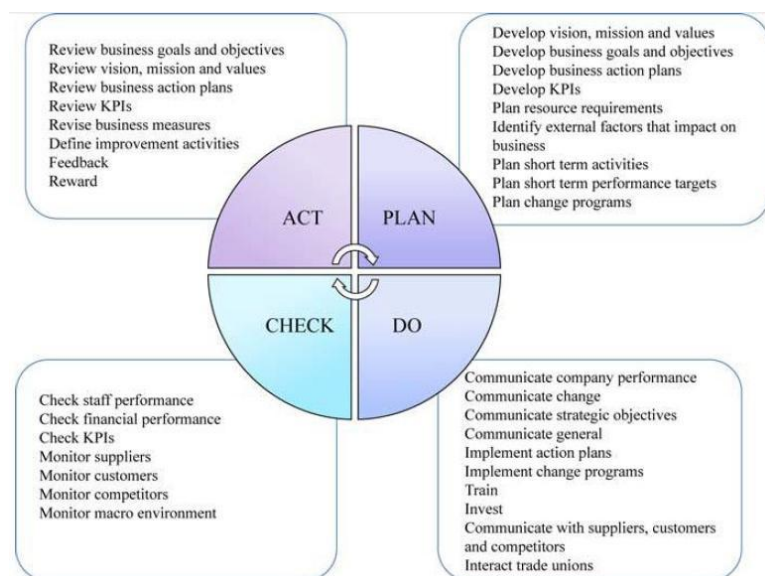


Figure 1. Generic SME managerial activities within the performance management process, (Ates et.al. 2013)
