## PRESENT SIMPLE

Subject + V1 (he, she, it - V-s/-es) Karla works every day.

Subject + **don't / doesn't** + V1 Karla doesn't work on Sundays. **Do / Does** + S + V1 Do you work on the weekend?

**Does** -> he, she, it **Do** -> I, we, you, they

Habits / routine -> (usually, often, sometimes, from time to time, occasionally, rarely, never)
Actions we do regularly -> (every day/week/ twice a week / on Mondays/ on the weekend)

Permanent actions -> Yuma lives in Japan.

Facts / timeless truth -> The sun **rises** in the East.

Scheduled events: timetable (transport, movie, class, business hours) -> What time **do** you **close** today? Our class **finishes** at 10 am.

In Time Clauses (WHEN, IF, AFTER, BEFORE, UNTIL) We <u>will practice</u> this grammar AFTER Elena <u>finishes</u> the explanation.

## PRESENT CONTINUOUS / PROGRESSIVE

S + be (am / is / are) + V-ing am - I / is - he, she, it / are - you, we, they

S + be + **not** (am not/isn't/aren't) + V-ing

Be (Am / Is / Are) + S + V-ing?

Action now / at present moment -> We **are studying** grammar now.

Longer action around now -> We **are studying** Present tenses this week.

In the middle of the process -> Karla **is studying for/working toward** her Master's Degree.

Something is changing over time (**get**, **become**, **grow**, **improve**, **change**..) -> The prices **are getting** higher every day. The days **are becoming/getting** shorter.

Temporary action -> We **are studying** in Canada now. Fixed plans/arrangements in the future. -> I'm seeing my doctor on Friday.

STATE=STATIVE and DYNAMIC=ACTION VERBS

Senses, mental work actions you can see

Know, love, like, hate, forget play, kiss, sleep, eat, do, study, clean, dance Never use STATE verbs in CONTINUOUS TENSES. We always use SIMPLE tenses.

I understand this (wrong: I'm understanding.)

State Dynamic

I <u>have</u> a car. (own, possess) HAVE We <u>are having</u> class now.

Coffee <u>smells</u> good. SMELL I'<u>m smelling</u> coffee. Coffee <u>tastes</u> bitter. TASTE He'<u>s tasting</u> wine.

You look nice today. LOOK She's looking for her keys.

I <u>think</u> you're right. (opinion) THINK

I'm thinking about my next vacation.

I feel we should go.(opinion) FEEL I'm feeling much better today. (physically or emotionally)

I <u>see</u>. (understand) SEE I'm seeing my doctor next week. (visit)

I can't <u>see</u> well. (ability to see) Karla <u>is seeing</u> Patrick. (dating)

## Don't confuse CONTINUOUS with GERUND!

I'm loving it! - emphasize something or exaggerate **Loving** people is a good sign of mercy. (gerund)
