Course Description

Through studio practice, application of design concepts and informed decision-making, students will assemble a body of artwork that demonstrates a high level of quality and growth over time regarding content, techniques, and process. Students are to use artistic integrity. The use of published images and other artists' works will be considered plagiarism, and will not be graded. Originality is emphasized, working from personal references and developing ideas through innovative use of materials, processes, and techniques.

Course Expectations

- AP Studio Drawing, 2D Design, and 3D Design Portfolios are taught simultaneously, which will expose you to a variety of
 media, techniques, and ideas. However, you will be focused on your choice of a specific portfolio that has specific
 requirements. Class critique will only happen once at the start of the semester; second semester your class will be split
 among all first level classes based on portfolio type and it will be your responsibility to meet with me outside of class time for
 more feedback than can be provided during class.
- AP Studio Art portfolio is designed for students who are <u>serious about art</u>. You should plan to have a piece always happening at home while another one is happening at school. The amount of work that is needed to complete a successful portfolio demands a minimum of 2 hours for every hour of class time (approximately 10 hours outside of class per week, in an environment conducive to creating art...studio, home, library, wherever your family accommodates you, etc.).
- Students are to work independently, using informed and critical decision-making, researching and developing ideas for 2
 different components of the portfolio:
 - (1) Sustained Investigation (60%) and (2) Selected Works (40%). As per Art Department policy, full-credit is only possible if sketches/refs, assignments, or projects are turned in by the due date. A half point/grade is deducted from full credit each day an assignment is late. Sketches & projects can only be turned in within the grading period in which it is due for credit. Medical notes etc. may modify this on a case-by-case basis.
 - <u>~ Sustained Investigation (12-15 pieces)</u>, students demonstrate technical versatility and skills with materials and techniques while developing a focused body of work through investigation, research, and writing about personal idea. WRITING is very important in the SI and will be focused upon during class and when turning in each artwork.
 - ~ Selected Works (5 pieces, may overlap with Sustained Investigation), students will select (with the teacher's assistance)

their 5 strongest pieces that have developed mastery in concept, composition, and execution. These may be from Sustained Investigation but do not have to be (anytime created during high school). Writing accompanies these works that are sent in.

Summer Expectations & Critique

A minimum of 2 projects are to be completed by students prior to the AP school year. These projects are due the second day of school. They are meant to begin developing ideas for your Sustained Investigation section.

- * Sketchbook ideas & artist research
- * One field trip planned for the class during first semester; potential other field trips second semester with other classes

Sketchbook Assignments

Throughout the AP semester, **SKETCHBOOK** assignments with accompanying writing will be a significant portion of your grade. Drawing, observations through visuals and notetaking, ideas, brainstorming, and exhibiting an understanding of design elements and principles and composition will be emphasized. We will discuss the possibility of maintaining a social media account that documents your creations and processes throughout the semester.

Critiques

Individual and minimal class critiques of art allow you to analyze (using the language of art) what you are accomplishing visually, as well as receive feedback about your work from your classmates and teacher.

Previous Work

Work may be submitted in a student's AP Portfolio that has been created prior to the AP Portfolio course in other classes, or outside of class, if it fulfills the requirements, relates to your SI in a significant way, and is approved. There must be documented evidence that accounts for any art-making outside of class and the teacher must see it being worked on during studio time. NO SURPRISES!!!

Field Trips & Guest Visitors (limited this year)

AP may visit a private art college this year. We may also view exhibits at museums to expose students to art that is done outside of the high school. Our program may also welcome public and private college/academy representatives from in and out of state to present their art curricula and student artwork to the AP Studio students (digitally or physically).

Art Shows/Exhibits

AP students will participate in student art shows, both juried and non-juried.

Summative Assessments (80% of your term grade):

- * 8-9 Sustained Investigation Projects with Written Reflection
- * 8-9 Sketches/contact sheets with references and written plans/ideation/research
- * 2 Summer projects with written reflections
- * Workflow: Sustained Investigation Connection/Theme → Research & Planning → Sketching/Photo Shoot → Experimentation with Materials → Documentation of your Process Across All Parts of Creation → Final Creation of the piece and Resolution of the Concept/Vision → Submission of Resolved Piece with Written Reflection → Individual Critique or Class Critique & Follow-Up Revision or Edits (as needed)
- * End of each semester culminating portfolio of work with evidence of 15 Sustained Investigation projects and/or process works, 5 Selected Works demonstrating your strongest artwork created during the school year or within your body of work

Summative Assignments (20% of your term grade):

- * Daily skill performance and use of allotted studio time
- * Studio setup and maintenance skill
- * Art show setup, participation and teardown
