R. W. Lutz Started First Airport Here

Richard W. Lutz, 68, of 1034 W. South Park Ave., who died Monday at 9 a.m. at Mercy Hospital, was instrumental in the initial development of Winnebago County Airport.

Vitally interested in air flight since World War I, in 1919 he started the first airfield in Oshkosh on the Fourth Street Road.

He campaigned to have the city and county purchase land for an airport, but his early efforts failed, and in 1927 he and three others organized Oshkosh Airport, Inc.

They purchased 100 acres on 20th Street and built a hangar there, and in 1937 hired S. J. "Steve" Wittman to manage the airport. In 1940, Winnebago
