My Job:

I see myself as both a facilitator and a coach. I want to help you grow and develop as an artist. No matter what you can do on your own, you can additionally increase your skills by being given challenging tasks by me and by being gently pushed by me. I also will help you figure out how to navigate the whole AP Art & Design portfolio thing. I will give you honest feedback based on over 20 years of teaching experience.

## Your Job:

You are the artist, learner, and peer reviewer. I expect you to want to grow and develop as an artist and be challenged--that's why you are here. This is not a class where you will *simply* "do your own thing"--although you will probably be going in a direction different from everyone else. This might involve more time than you are used to and some ego bruising if you do not take feedback as it is meant to be: which is <a href="helpful">helpful</a>. (If you need me to be warm and fuzzy with my feedback on a particular day I understand--just let me know.) I will ask you to look critically at not only your own work, but that of your peers--you will need to be honest with yourself and you'll need honesty from your peers.

## My Guarantee:

You will be asked and expected to work hard in this class. If you choose to do so, your art will improve and you will come out of this with many pieces for an art portfolio and potential college supplemental portfolio.

**Ceramics II** focuses on both refining your hand-building skills and teaching you to throw on the wheel. You'll be asked to create more challenging forms, as well as be exposed to more surface, glazing, and firing techniques, and be responsible for more studio care (such as wedging up recycled clay and more thorough cleaning)

While there are typical criteria / guidelines for projects, and teaching and learning of new techniques, students are encouraged and expected to take their personal research and ideas further. You'll continue to be asked to create more challenging forms, as well as be exposed to more surface, glazing, and firing techniques, and be responsible for more studio care (such as wedging up recycled clay and more thorough cleaning)
