Advanced Placement United States History is a college-level course, which is intended to give students the skills necessary to become successful college students. Because of this, the assignments and assessments are geared to be challenging to high school students. There is also an emphasis on developing strong essay-writing skills. There are three types of essays on the AP Exam -- a series of Short-Answer Questions (SAQ), a Document-Based Question (DBQ) and a Long Essay Question (LEQ) -- that ask students to assess change and continuity, comparisons, or causation. These essays will be the focus of our writing assignments.
