- b. In addition, while millions have been lifted out of poverty, billions of people live close to the poverty line and face a constant risk of falling into extreme poverty. Despite significant global progress in gradually expanding social protection coverage, including social protection floors, almost four billion people still lack access to any form of social protection, including nearly two billion children.

A Call to Action

We will adopt a holistic approach towards the eradication of poverty in all its forms and dimensions, including through addressing the challenges of extreme poverty and multidimensional poverty, address their disproportionate impact on countries in special situations and people in vulnerable situations and combat the feminization of poverty while ensuring that the focus is on building resilience to shocks and challenges, accelerating actions to eradicate poverty and avoiding relapsing back into it. In this regard we commit to:

Taking effective measures, including policies and programmes, to address the root causes of poverty and underlying causes of inequality, providing for the basic needs of all and increasing resilience for interconnected crises. These efforts should include the elimination of hunger and malnutrition; the provision of social protection, food security, education, livelihood, employment, decent work for all, clean water and sanitation, adequate shelter and reliable health systems; and participation in social and cultural life, with special priority given to the needs and rights of women and children and persons in vulnerable situations, who often bear the greatest burden of poverty.
- d. Ensuring sustainable and equitable financing for social protection systems as one of the enablers for eradicating poverty, reducing inequality and fostering social inclusion, as well as investing in programs for poverty eradication, including the feminization of poverty, to address underlying causes of inequality by promoting sustainable economy for the wellbeing of all.

Promoting the integration of child-sensitive policies and programmes in national poverty eradication strategies, including social protection programmes that deliver an integrated package of essential services, including investments in nutrition, early childhood development and universal child benefits.

- i) Globally, two billion women and girls remain without any access to social protection, compared to 1.8 billion men and boys. If current trends continue, by 2030, an estimated 8 % of the world's female population 342.4 million women and girls will still be living on less than \$2.15 a day.
- k) While efforts have been made to increase social protection coverage, 3.8 billion people lack any kind of social safety net, including 1.8 billion children worldwide.

I- Eradication of Poverty:

- a) Reinforce the necessary measures to upscale investment in social protection as an enabler for eradicating poverty and fostering social inclusion.

- e) Encourage to consider supporting the implementation of the Global Accelerator on Jobs and Social Protection for Just Transitions. f) Take the necessary measures to address youth unemployment and to support older workers and their employment opportunities.
- i) Reinforce investment in universal and sustainable social protection systems, as a critical enabler of inclusive growth and social resilience
- l) Consider the multiplier effects of the care economy in terms of increasing labour participation, facilitating the transition from informal to formal work and decent working conditions in the care sector, investing in social infrastructure and strengthening social protection, as well as the returns on the investments in care policies and systems.

d) Respond to demographic shifts and their implications for social integration: - For older persons: strengthen social protection systems, access to healthcare, long term care, lifelong learning, and digital inclusion. IV. Call for action to close the gaps in the commitments of Copenhagen and give momentum towards the implementation of the 2030 agenda.

Poverty Eradication

• Upscaling investment in social protection is necessary to eradicate poverty and fostering social inclusion and promoting the transition to formal employment whilst enhancing resilience to interconnected shocks like pandemics, conflicts, and climate change. This including through the funding of social protection floors, with particular attention to the needs of people in impoverished and vulnerable situations and strengthening social protection systems to guarantee universal coverage, providing stability and security across the life course. Member States may wish to consider a realistic target to extend social protection coverage by at least two percentage points per year.

Full and productive employment and decent work for all:

• Upscaling investment in social protection [see above section].

Social Integration:

• Reducing inequalities within and among countries, ensuring fair income distribution and expanding access to basic services. Considering the demographic changes and their variety of impacts on social integration. For older persons, need for strengthening social protection systems, access to healthcare, long-term care, employment opportunities, policies supporting older workers, lifelong learning, and digital inclusion. For youth, ensuring access to quality education, STEM and digital skills. Investing in early childhood development, ensuring access to education, health, nutrition and protection of children against violence, exploitation and abuse and combating child labour.
