COURSE CATALOG DESCRIPTION

FSHD 1355 Flat Pattern Design II

A continuation of Flat Pattern Design I with emphasis on patterns for tailored garments. Instruction in creating a jacket sloper with a two-piece suit sleeve to make patterns for a variety of jacket silhouettes. Adding shoulder pad allowance, drafting patterns for jacket linings and interfacing pieces, lapel and collar variations and various pants shapes.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY

This course is designed as a lecture/lab combined course. Students will work on the same projects during class time with instructor guidance. Successful completion of this course requires maturity and self discipline with keen attention to details. All students are required to have the appropriate tools needed for every class session, as the pace of the course does not allow for shared equipment or tools. Students should arrive on time with required supplies, set up and ready to start and attend every class. Having your supplies at every class is required. If you do not bring your supplies to class, it will affect your overall grade. Missed work will need to be made-up outside of class, prior to the start of the next class. Missed work will not allow for progress to the next assignments as each step builds on the previous step. Open Lab times will be available for students during posted times. You are encouraged to ask questions and actively engage in class discussions. I am here to help you develop the skills you will need to be successful in the Fashion Design industry and more specifically develop good habits as a pattern maker and designer. Please know that you can always come to me with questions, comments or concerns you have related to the course work.

COURSE RATIONALE

The Fashion Design program prepares students for careers in fashion related fields. Creative studies in design fundamentals, fashion analysis, fashion history, textiles, color, and sketching, along with technical training in draping, pattern making, pattern grading,

and clothing construction provide the training required for entry-level employment. The Flat Pattern Design II course focuses on the skills necessary to draft patterns from a drawing, measurements or from an existing garment or pattern and be able to create the garment using industry standards and equipment.

COMMON COURSE LEARNING

OBJECTIVES/OUTCOMES

Create a jacket sloper and two-piece sleeve sloper. Design patterns for various jacket silhouettes, collar/lapel variations, and pant shapes. Produce patterns for jacket linings and interfacing pieces. Record the formula for adding shoulder pad allowance to the pattern.
