The name "Darwin's Frog" may refer to a family of frogs known as Rhinodermatidae, or a species of frog within that family. Today we're talking about that species, which is also known as the Southern Darwin's Frog.

This frog lives in forest streams of Chile and Argentina, and is named after- you guessed it-Charles Darwin. Females are typically brown, while males can be brown or green, but each has a flat back and a pointed, triangular snout which make it look like a fallen leaf- very useful for avoiding predators.

Female Darwin's frogs lay their eggs on the forest floor. The male will then guard them for up to 4 weeks and then swallow them.
