School Programs and/or Initiatives:

BBMS teaches an integrated curriculum. This form of teaching places emphasis on advanced content knowledge, relies on higher order thinking skills, and focuses learning on major ideas or "themes" that cross several disciplines.

A core theme is studied and learned through concepts related to the theme, and applied and simulated through activities related to the theme. We call these twelve week units of study centered around a theme, streams. Some examples of streams are: Your Life, Your Business; Work Hard, Play Hard; Flight; Calling All Heroes; Colony to Country; and Architecture.

Stream content is typically taught with a three-tier approach, a sequence of learning that assists students in most successfully attaining what they learn and giving their education real-world value. First the Acquisition Tier addresses core skills and foundational knowledge (example: vocabulary), then the Application Tier extends the knowledge base and provides enrichment (example: performing or making presentation), and the Simulation Tier (example: creative expression of applied knowledge).
