Common Course Description:

A studio art course that introduces basic building, throwing, and other techniques as it relates to the design and production of ceramic sculpture and pottery.

Prerequisites: ARTS 1311-Design 1 and ARTS 1312-Design 2 (or departmental approval). Instructors may recommend skills to succeed in course.

Course Rationale:

The purpose of Ceramics I is to provide each student with a basic ceramics experience extended from his or her knowledge of design and drawing on which to build the visual thinking skills, knowledge of historical and contemporary art forms, technical approach to materials and the methods for channeling creative energies that enable a life-time of personal artistic expression.

Common Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Generate works that demonstrate descriptive, expressive, and conceptual approaches.
- Apply the elements of art and principles of design.
- Use varied processes including, but not limited to, hand building, throwing, glazing, and firing.
- Demonstrate additive and subtractive processes.
- Analyze and critique works verbally and/or in writing.
- Relate ceramics to art history and contemporary artistic production.
- Demonstrate an appropriate level of professional practice, including safety, craft, and presentation.

ACC Specific Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Translate perceptual awareness into ceramic form.
- Demonstrate confidence in and strategies toward individual creativity.
- Demonstrate knowledge of contemporary and historic artistic models.

- Demonstrate knowledge of art as cultural information.
- Perform exercises in visualization and critical thinking.
- Demonstrate knowledge of and perform safe and effective studio practices.
- Work with a plastic, three dimensional medium in the creation of utilitarian and sculptural ceramic forms.
- Use tools to express themselves in clay through hand-building techniques of coil and slab methods.
- Demonstrate a knowledge of glaze application, decorative methods, and firing methods.
- Demonstrate planning and patience in carrying through a project in multi-step system while maintaining the integrity of the work area.
- Utilize the elements and principles of design in the development of ceramic forms.
- Present their completed work in a professional manner.

Required Texts/Materials: Determined by instructor from department-approved textbooks.

Instructional Methodology: Determined by instructor. Methodology may include: Lectures, demonstrations, critiques, digital image and video presentations, quizzes, exams, writing assignments, research papers, group assignments and gallery/museum visits.

Grading System: Determined by instructor

For example:

- Understanding of the concept and objectives of the assignment – 15 pts.
- Craftsmanship– 20 pts.
- Composition: balance, rhythm, movement, form, texture, line, space, and color – 20pts.
- Visual Impact, expressiveness – 15 pts.
- Your work performance in class, attendance, cooperation, attentiveness, receptiveness, progress, productivity, timely completion, presentation – 30 pts.

Final grades will be determined by considering the following: Attendance, project grades and class participation. There will be a mid-semester check on individual student's progress.

Grading:

A (100 – 90)

This means outstanding work. The work shows innovation, and the solution of the problem reflects significant depth of understanding of the problem and solutions. The solution for the problem assigned has been fully developed in form. The solution is unique and unusual.

B(89 - 80)

This means good work. Solutions have exceeded all requirements and show above average depth of understanding. The project demonstrates more than adequate clarity of idea and execution.

C (79 - 70)

This means average work. The problem has been solved adequately, but the solution lacks depth of understanding and development. The overall solution lacks innovation and generally does not provoke excitement.

D (69 - 60)

This means poor work. The solution is extremely weak and lacks understanding and innovation. Technical skills are weak.

F (Failing)

This means unacceptable work. The solution to the problem is unresolved, incomplete, and poorly portrayed.

Course Policies

Attendance: [Determined by instructor.](#)

For example: Regular and punctual class and laboratory attendance is expected of all students. Attendance will be taken at each class meeting. You are permitted three absences. If you have four absences it will drop you one letter grade. If you have five absences you may be dropped from the class. Persistent tardiness or leaving class early is not acceptable and may result in your being dropped from the course. (Three tardies or leaving early equals one absence). *This is a studio course, it is required that you be in class on time and participate.*

Missed or late work: [Determined by instructor.](#)

For example: Late work will drop one letter grade for each class period past due date.

Withdrawal: [Determined by instructor](#)

Instructor may state it is the responsibility of students to withdraw or the conditions for an instructor-initiated withdrawal. For example: if a student stops attending class or has missed more than three classes and is not successfully completing course work, the instructor reserves the right to initiate withdrawal. Incomplete: Instructors will issue an "incomplete" grade only for extraordinary cases with extenuating circumstances. Instructors may include general guidelines for awarding incompletes. For example: Incomplete grades (I) will be given only in rare circumstances. Generally, to receive a grade of "I," a student must have successfully completed most of the coursework but after the last date to withdraw have a serious situation occur which prevents course completion. An instructor may award a grade of "I" (Incomplete) if a student is unable to complete the last of the coursework. An incomplete grade cannot be carried beyond the established date in the following semester. The completion date is determined by the instructor but may not be later than the final deadline for withdrawal in the subsequent semester.

Students Rights and Responsibilities:

Freedom of Expression: Each student is strongly encouraged to participate in class. In any classroom situation that includes discussion and critical thinking, there are bound to be many differing viewpoints. These differences enhance the learning experience and create an atmosphere where students and instructors alike will be encouraged to think

and learn. On sensitive and volatile topics, students may sometimes disagree not only with each other but also with the instructor. It is expected that faculty and students will respect the views of others when expressed in classroom discussions.

Academic Freedom: Institutions of higher education are conducted for the common good. The common good depends upon a free search for truth and its free expression. Hence it is essential that faculty members at Austin Community College be free to pursue scholarly inquiry without unreasonable restriction and to voice and publish their conclusions without fear of institutional censorship or discipline. They must be free from the possibility that others of differing vision, either inside or outside the college community, may threaten their professional careers. The concept of academic freedom in Austin Community College is accompanied by an equally demanding concept of responsibility, shared by the Board of Trustees, administration, and faculty members. In the classroom or in College-produced telecommunications, faculty members should strive to be accurate, to exercise appropriate restraint, and to show respect for the opinions of others. In addition, instructors should be judicious in the use of material and should introduce only material that has a clear relationship to the subject field.

Student Discipline: Students at the College have the rights accorded to all persons under the Constitution to freedom of speech, peaceful assembly, petition, and association. These rights carry with them the responsibility for each individual to accord the same rights to others in the College community and not to interfere with or disrupt the educational process. As willing partners in learning, it is expected that students will comply with College rules and procedures.
