NSPL President's Report for 2020

What a year! For powerlifting as for everything, 2020 was a rollercoaster.

It began well with the Mike Laroche in Sydney, hosted by Chad Sinclair. A small meet but as always, fun and relaxed for everyone involved. The NSPL team flew out 1 day later to Winnipeg for the 2020 CPU National Championships.

NSPL brought a small team to Winnipeg in 2020 but still brought a great deal of medals and respect back home to Nova Scotia. My proudest moment was getting to the last session of the week (coincidentally mine) and realizing that even though we were a small group, a member of the NSPL was volunteering on the platform or in the chair for every single session the entire nationals. Keep in mind that there are approximately 3 sessions a day for 6 days. I was so immensely proud of the support and sportsmanship shown by the NSPL team. The other provinces see our contributions and look to us as an example of powerlifters invested in making this sport the best it can be.

Little did we know that when we flew back from Nationals, we would be going almost directly into lockdowns. I don't think any of us could have suspected that we wouldn't be allowed to host our June provincials until November.

Luckily, we were able to navigate a tricky Return-to-Play process with the province and be allowed to host what ended up being our first ever full 2-day provincials. This sport is growing in Nova Scotia!

The NSPL was in a good financial position at the end of 2020. As we were still able to host some meets our membership stayed up and we successfully maintained full funding from the province.

On the topic of financials, at the very beginning of 2021 the provincial powerlifting organizations became responsible for new expenses from the CPU:

- Drug Testing – Previously, we paid CCES specifically for tests done in NS. Apparently, this was not a tenable position with WADA as it didn't guarantee that the CPU drug program was administered in the strictly required way. Instead, the CPU is invoicing each province \$15 per competitor at a competition, invoiced within 2 weeks of the competition. If possible, the NSPL will carry these costs via provincial funding as opposed to increasing meet fees for members. But as meet participation grows it may be unavoidable.

- Insurance – The CPU informed us on December 16th, 2020 that the provinces would no longer be included in their Board of Directors insurance. Because of this, the NSPL was required to acquire its own insurance with an annual cost of approximately \$800.

In terms of funding, we were able to acquire a bit of additional Covid-related funding from the province as well. This puts our organization back in the same stable fiscal position it was before we did our last large equipment purchase – this means that the NSPL is now again in the position to make new investments. I'm happy to pass the reins to a new administration with a healthy bank account and organized setup to fully support them in bringing their new vision to life.

It's been an incredible honour to be your president these last three years. I have enjoyed representing the NSPL with the CPU and working with all of you to help make the NSPL better. Happily, my partner and I have been posted to Greenwood base instead of Winnipeg, so you'll still see me around at meet and in the reffing chair.
