Applicants are also evaluated on nonacademic factors. Some examples may include Shadowing, Community Service, Researching, Leadership Skills, Teamwork, Diversity Experience, Teaching, Publications etc.

• Advocacy Experience: Advocacy experience helps candidates develop skills and comfort in taking on some of the responsibilities of a counseling or supportive role. This may be accomplished through a volunteer or paid position with a community-based agency such as a crisis intervention program, Planned Parenthood affiliate, domestic violence program, hospice program, etc., through a position as a resident assistant or student advisor; or through some related activity. The advocacy experience should provide sufficient opportunity to work in a responsible, one-on-one (in person, by telephone, or text/web-based) relationship with a variety of individuals seeking information, resources, guidance, counseling, or other support services made available through the sponsoring agency or organization. Advocacy experience typically includes training in interpersonal and related skills, ongoing supervision, and opportunities for feedback and continued growth. Most applicants complete this experience on a part-time basis in the evenings and weekends while attending school or working full-time.

WSU

- Advocacy Experience: Our program specifically would like applicants to have counseling advocacy experience- i.e., experiences where a person receives training in counseling/interpersonal communication skills and then uses those skills to help someone in distress. Examples include but are not limited to crisis counseling hotlines (including crisis text hotlines), domestic violence hotlines/shelters, sexual assault hotlines/advocacy, grief and loss support organizations, peer counseling experiences, and resident assistant positions. Questions about applicable experiences can be addressed to the program directors.
- Insight into the Genetic Counseling Profession: Successful applicants should be able to show that they have investigated the genetic counseling profession and can describe their reasons for wanting to become a genetic counselor. There are many ways to learn about the profession. Shadowing and/or meeting with genetic counselors are effective ways to learn more about the profession, when possible. There are many other ways to learn about the profession. These include watching podcasts about genetic counseling and patient experiences with genetic conditions, watching videos of mock genetic counseling sessions, attending open houses/seminars hosted by genetic counseling programs (many of which are now virtual), attending genetic counseling conferences (again, many of which may be virtual), reading about genetic counselor, and/or taking a course on genetic counseling. To find genetic counselors in your area that are willing to meet with prospective applicants, use the NSGC Find a Counselor Tool.

Personal Statement

A personal statement is for you to express your motivation and desire to become a genetics counselor and what makes you unique as an applicant. This statement is sent to all the schools you apply to, so you don't want to direct it to a specific school. It should be more of a story, not a resume and should not list experiences again.

Letter of Recommendation

3 to 5 Letter of Recommendation

Each school requires different types of individuals to write the letters

Examples: Professor, Supervisor, Genetic Counselor, etc.

Interviews

Personal Interviews are given to the only top applicants who meet the requirements.

Typically Traditional Interviews

The candidates are usually interviewed by one or more people.

The questions will be more about you as an individual, special life experiences, and what you learned from these life experiences. Students should review the application before the interview and research possible interview questions.
