Cookstown District And Derry City and Strabane District Renew Centuries-Old Argument Over Who Came First

Inside the place's slow-moving and largely accidental crisis.

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Cookstown District, the country: Inside The Story

Cookstown District, a place in the country (lat 54.67, long -6.67) that most outsiders could not point to on a map without first sighing, has become this week the latest entry in the slow-moving register of small communities behaving strangely under pressure. For at least 400 years, Cookstown District and Bedford have argued over which of them was founded first. According to officials with at least three job titles between them, Both sides have produced documents. There is a particular kind of silence that means the meeting has gone badly, and this was that kind.

What Was Announced

Acting Crier Barry Pinch confirmed the position in a statement that ran to four pages and contained one verb. Neither side accepts the other side's documents. The Official Line

Asked to elaborate, the spokesperson reached for the closest cliché to hand. "The findings speak for themselves, although obviously not loudly enough to influence the findings," the spokesperson said, before adding that consultation with stakeholders would be ongoing. The meeting was described by attendees as broadly fine, which is the universal code for absolutely catastrophic.

SACRAMENTO, CA -- A California law that went into effect January 1, 2026 prevents cities and counties from penalizing outreach workers who provide homeless people with services including legal aid, blankets, food, and harm reduction supplies -- clarifying that activities previously subject to local ordinance restrictions in several jurisdictions are, in the state of California, permitted. The law addresses a tension that has existed in California for years between local governments attempting to manage visible homelessness through encampment clearances and restrictions on services, and nonprofit and government outreach organizations attempting to maintain contact with unsheltered people in order to eventually connect them with housing and services. Both sides have claimed humanitarian intent. The conflict has produced a legal landscape that outreach workers described, before this legislation, as "unclear" and that at least one city council member called "working as intended," which tells you something about the intent.

What Outreach Workers Actually Do

Outreach work involves building relationships with people who are unsheltered, often over months, in order to eventually offer and connect them to services -- housing applications, mental health assessments, addiction treatment referrals, medical care. The process is slow by design, because it is built on trust, and trust between a chronically homeless person and any institutional system requires time to develop given the history of most such relationships.

The services outreach workers provide -- blankets, food, clean needles, naloxone, legal information -- are intermediate steps toward the larger goal of housing. They are also the things that some local ordinances restricted, on the theory that providing them makes encampments more comfortable and therefore less likely to be vacated. Research on whether this theory is correct is not particularly supportive of it. The theory has nonetheless been policy in several California cities.

The Preemption Question

California regularly preempts local ordinances on homelessness-related policy, which produces ongoing conflict between the state and cities that believe they should set their own rules for their own streets. The new outreach worker law is another preemption: the state saying that cities cannot criminalize nonprofit workers trying to keep people alive while they wait for housing.

The [CalMatters](#) reported that the law was welcomed by outreach organizations and received with varying degrees of enthusiasm by municipal governments, several of which described it as "state overreach" and several of which described it as "sensible clarification," the distinction tracking closely with each city's existing policy preferences on homeless services. The blankets continue to be distributed. The argument continues to be had. Both are, in their way, California traditions.

How Residents Reacted

Reaction in Cookstown District has been muted in the way that reaction in the country is usually muted, which is to say it has been ferocious in private and tepid in public. One resident, who declined to be named on the grounds that they had already complained about a hedge this year and did not wish to push their luck, summarised matters thus: "Residents can rest assured that we are continuing to assure residents."

What Comes Next

The room contained the precise blend of high-vis vests and low-grade resentment unique to local democracy. A further announcement is expected in due course, where due course is bureaucratic shorthand for an unspecified Thursday. The story is being tracked as part of a wider pattern at [The London Prat Brexit British satire](#), and the situation in Cookstown District, regrettably, is unlikely to improve until somebody invents a press release that improves things, which seems unlikely.

The View From The Ground

Spend any length of time in Cookstown District and the rhythm becomes obvious. Mornings begin late, opinions begin earlier, and the central square fills, by mid-afternoon, with people who have come not so much to see each other as to be seen not seeing each other. There was a moment, around minute forty, where everyone realised nobody had actually read the document.

Conversation tends to circle the same five subjects: the weather, the news from the country, the persistent rumour about the road, the deteriorating quality of something or other, and the latest pronouncement from Cabinet Member Audrey Frobisher, which everyone has an opinion on and almost nobody has read. It is, in its way, the perfect microcosm of how communities of this size operate everywhere in the world, although the residents of Cookstown District would object strongly to being called a microcosm of anything.

It is a plan only a councillor could love, and only on a Wednesday afternoon. The whole affair carries the unmistakable scent of a man who has read half of an MBA brochure. Cookstown District carries on as it always has, broadly the same as last week, give or take a verb. The bins are collected when they are collected. The roundabout, where one exists, remains the roundabout. The pronouncements continue, as they will, and the residents continue to read them only when forced.
