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Assessment 2 – Using Primary Data

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Describe the emergent themes from a group of people profiled in LifeHacker’s How I Work series. Purposefully Select 10 cases from LifeHacker’s “How I Work” series (<http://lifehacker.com/tag/how-i-work>). For example, for a purposeful sample you may select women, entrepreneurs, people who work in technical fields, people who work in creative fields, etc. Code the interviews as qualitative data and find themes among the responses. Write a report describing the themes in the interviews. The paper should be 4-5 pages, not including title page or works cited. There will be a full grade penalty for each page over five.
