 - i. VPFO Adusumilli: yielded to president Jo Kovach.
 - ii. President Kovach: spoke on discussions about memorializing the students that were lost on 2/13
 - iii. VPFO Adusumilli: spoke on conversations with IPF
 - iv. VPIA CAMG: spoke on the importance of community, and commemorating the students that were lost.
 - v. Rep Le: spoke on his experience writing the bill, and the importance of remembering the victims as the Spartans they were.
 - vi. Rep Presley: asked question about the benches and whether writing can be replaced
 - vii. Rep Haitaian: asked question about the decision to make this piece of remembrance a bench.
 - viii. President Kovach: explained the reasoning behind creating a space where students can mourn and grieve.
 - ix. Rep Tocco: suggested changes to make the bench more of a memorial and distinguish it.
 - x. Rep Zivian: spoke about personal experiences, as well as seeking assurances from the university that the bench will have significance.
 - xi. Rep Barash: motion to accept the suggestions on bill 59-100

 - i. VPSA Omar: explained that the code of operations has not been reviewed in years, and these amendments are the result of revisions
 - ii. Rep Jaberu: reiterated what VPSA Omar said.
 - iii. Motion to vote via unanimous consent
 - iv. So moved
 - v. Bills 59-103 through 107 pass via unanimous consent
- v. 59-104: Amend Title II of the Student Allocations Board Code of Operations
- w. 59-105: Amend Title III of the Student Allocations Board Code of Operations

 - ii. Rep Presley: talked about how people are being paid unfairly on campus, and how a four dollar change could help students
 - iii. VPFO: clarified that international students have a different hour limit than domestic students
 - iv. Rep Masud: asked clarifying question about whether this is an advocacy point
 - v. VPFO: discussed plans for \$15 minimum wage regardless of tax
 - vi. Rep Pandya: discussed discomfort with voting yes without knowing the election results
 - vii. President Kovach: discussed the importance of the advocacy, regardless of the tax increase
 - viii. Rep Tocco: yielded time to their replacement
 - ix. Julia Robbins: asked about undergraduate research
 - x. VPFO Adusumilli: clarified that it would be all on-campus jobs
 - xi. Rep Tocco: discussed that \$15 is not enough money and even \$20 is not enough. Suggested raising the numbers
 - xii. VPFO: clarified that some jobs can still pay more than 15 dollars
 - xiii. President Kovach: spoke on state legislation that is currently pending

- xiv. Rep Jalan: talked about how a 15 dollar minimum wage would benefit international students too.
- xv. Rep Presley: asked question about tips
- xvi. President Kovach: clarified that this will serve as a baseline wage
- xvii. Rep Barash: pointed out that while 15 dollars is not enough to live, it has been a rallying cry for years, and an important step. Motioned to add amendments to the bill.
- xviii. So moved
 - xix. Amendments are added
 - xx. Rep Mandwee: pointed out that even with the current tax, ASMSU should still pay 15 dollars
 - xxi. Question has been called
- xxii. Bill 59-108 has been approved

- ix. VPAA Iturralde: discussed SARV and RVSM trainings as overarching trainings, and suggested making mental health workshops broader.

- xi. Rep Tocco: discussed accommodating these workshops to neurodivergent students.
- xii. Rep Presley: reiterated what other representatives and the VPAA said.
