ALL Exhibitors Must Be Issued An Exhibitor Number

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

The following rules apply to all exhibitors, Exhibit Building, Livestock, Rabbits, and Poultry:

Fair Board has final say over interpretation of wording in the fair book

1. ALL exhibitors must be issued an exhibitor number. Exhibitors must register and pick-up exhibitor numbers Sunday during exhibit building check-in. **LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS AND PARENTS MUST ATTEND CLASS/MEETING AND SIGN CONTRACTS DURING DESIGNATED TIMES JULY 11, 2026 @ 10:00AM OR JULY 14, 2026 @ 6:00PM BEFORE AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER IS GIVEN. THERE WILL BE A LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR FORM THAT WILL NEED TO BE FILLED OUT AT THE CONCLUSION OF THE MEETING AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER WILL BE ASSIGNED**

Exhibitors MUST Check-In and be given an exhibitor number before entering exhibit items.

2. Home Economics and Horticulture exhibits must be picked up Sunday September 6, 2026 **between 9am-1pm.** Livestock, Rabbits, and Poultry must remain in place until 9:00pm **Saturday September 5, 2026.**

Prize money will not be awarded if exhibits are removed before the deadline!

3. Exhibits must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner.

4. In order to be eligible for the Jr Livestock Auction, the exhibitor must be: (a) a permanent resident of Madison County as of January 1, of the current year, or (b) enrolled in a Madison County school as of January 1, of the current year and must have completed the spring semester as an enrolled student.

5. Exhibit Building Superintendents have the authority to reclassify items into the appropriate dept./class.

6. Judges' decisions will be final. Ribbons and points will be awarded as follows: Each item entered in the exhibit building will be judged on quality and awarded either a 1st Place= blue ribbon, 2nd Place= red ribbon or 3rd Place= White ribbon with each age division in every class having only one 1st place, 2nd and 3rd place points awarded. The color of the ribbon has no bearing on the amount of points earned or the amount of premium paid. A grand and reserve champion will be selected for every age division (except Cloverbud). A best of show will be selected from the **jr. and sr. youth division and from the adult and sr. adult division.**

7. Each division will be paid on a point basis as determined by the amount of funds allotted by the AR Livestock and Poultry Commission. Example: If you have five points and 30 cents per point is set, the amount paid will be \$1.50.

8. No one under the age of 5 will receive premium points in livestock or exhibit buildings.

Exhibitors ages 3&4 can show in exhibit building for ribbons, but are given no premium points.

Livestock exhibitors under 5 will only receive ribbons with no premium points.

9. AGE (as of fair start date) DIVISIONS IN THE EXHIBITOR BUILDINGS ARE AS FOLLOWED:

- a. 5-8 Clover bud
- b. 9-13 Junior
- c. 14-19 Senior
- d. 20-64 Adult
- e. 65 & up Senior Adult
- f. Professional Division – Anyone that makes money for their craft.

AGE (as of fair start date) DIVISIONS IN THE LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS ARE AS FOLLOWED:

- a. 5-8 Clover bud
- b. 9-13 Junior

Youth may exhibit livestock no later than the year following graduation.

Example: Exhibitor graduated High School in May of previous year.

YOUTH AGE 5 TO 8 WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW LIVESTOCK EXCEPT: SWINE UNDER 100 POUNDS, GOATS, SHEEP, RABBITS, POULTRY, AND BUCKET CALVES. FOR SAFETY REASONS, THIS RULE WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.

10. In no case, shall the MADISON COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION, Inc. or any of its officers or directors, be held responsible for any loss, damage, injury, death, disease, theft, loss or death of livestock, poultry, rabbits, or other cause to any property while on the fairgrounds. The management assumes no responsibility for any property brought upon the fairgrounds. If property owners, or others interested in the property, desire protection against loss, damage, or injury from any cause, they must make their own arrangements and pay for such insurance.

11. The fair board retains the right to deal with situations such as: errors, misprints, or mis-interpretations in this book as to what we intended to state.

12. The Livestock Department Superintendents will consist of Madison County Fair Board members.

13. High point exhibitors will go to the JR (9-13) or SR (14-19) with the most accumulated points in the livestock departments. May win only every other year.

14. There will be no camping on the fairgrounds, a fair board member will be staying on the premises at all times during the fair for safety reasons.

15. NO trailer parking behind the bleachers, on the side of the hog, sheep and goat barn, or across from the same barn this will be reserved for car and truck parking only. Trailers will be parked in a designated area.

16. Motorized vehicles (golf carts, side by sides, four wheelers) will not be allowed on the grounds unless driven by a fair board member because of insurance reasons.

17. No parents in the show arena during any show or during the junior livestock auction.

MADISON COUNTY FAIR OUTSTANDING YOUTH

This award is selected and presented by the Madison County Fair Board. This award is to recognize an exhibitor who goes above and beyond. An exhibitor who is helpful to others, actively participates in community service, demonstrates healthy sportsmanship and/or herdsmanship practices, leadership skills and is a great representation of the Madison County Fair in the community as they encourage local businesses, clubs and individuals to become involved in the Madison County Fair.

EXHIBIT HALL EXHIBITOR PARTICIPATION RULES

Rules apply to ALL exhibits and exhibitors.

1. All exhibits must be created, constructed, painted, written, canned, baked, crafted (any and all forms describing items being made) and grown (including exhibits being entered into the floral, field crops, apiary) by the exhibitor who is entering the item and done so after the previous year's fair.

EXCEPTION: the following articles must have been made within THREE YEARS FOLLOWING THE PREVIOUS FAIR; quilts, crocheted afghans and table cloths.

2. Each exhibit item **MUST** have an attached and completely filled out exhibitor tag at the time of the item being checked-in to its respective department on Sunday.

PLEASE NOTE: Exhibit items that are not properly tagged will be considered disqualified from judging and **WILL NOT** receive points for that entry.

Entry tag MUST HAVE the following information on them

3. No dirty, **soiled** or stained items may not be entered.

4. Only one entry per person per class. No Duplicates.

5. No exhibit is eligible to compete if that item **HAS EVER** been entered in the Madison County Fair (disqualifying previously entered items are at the discretion of the department supervisor) or any surrounding county fairs.

6. All exhibits not picked up by 1:00pm Sunday. A pickup appointment must be made for items left after 1:00pm. These buildings are used for various events outside of the fair and the fair board assumes no responsibility for items that could be broken or stolen.

We are excited to welcome back local businesses, clubs and organizations at the Madison County Fair. In the past local businesses, clubs and organizations have been located in the "main exhibit hall" while our exhibitors' exhibits were split between 2 buildings. What we noticed by having this set up, was a lack of community engagement in our second building. In this building there are great displays of community educational booths, industrial and agri arts and so many other exhibit departments.

This year we are restructuring the layout of our main exhibit hall and our commercial building

(both buildings offer air conditioning and electrical outlets)

In doing this we are excited to offer 3 different setup options.

Option 1-Manned Space: A 10x10 space with electricity in the commercial building.

These spaces **MUST** be manned during carnival hours Wednesday-Saturday.

If you need tables for your space they will be available on a first come basis. So prepare to bring your own tables just in case. The Madison County Fair does have chairs you may use.

Option 2-Unmanned space: This is a booth space in our commercial building.

Suggested for this space is a tri-fold project board that has information, helpful tips or promoting your club, organization or business. You can also have promotional items like handouts, pens, candy, etc. for community members to take with them as they view the buildings and its exhibits.

Option 3- Outside Spaces: These spaces are near the main ticket gate/entrance. These spaces have no access to electricity and are typically reserved for our local volunteer fire departments or police department.

EDUCATIONAL BOOTHS

Community Club and Unmanned Business booths should be set up on Sunday, August 30, 2026 between 1:00p.m. and 5:00p.m. These booths are to remain in place until Sunday, September 6, 2026.

Prize money will not be awarded to booths removed before this time.

Educational booths are open to any Madison County organization or business (business booths are only available for a ribbon only).

Awards will be given as follows: First place/Grand champion ribbon and \$15.00; second place/Reserve champion ribbon and \$10.00; third place ribbon and \$5.00 to clubs/organizations.

EXHIBIT BUILDING PROMOTIONAL AWARDS

To encourage and promote, the Madison County Fair gives awards to the individuals accumulating the most points in the age division. Youth must have a minimum of 35 points and adults/seniors must have a minimum of 50 points. An individual can only win the award every other year. The Madison County

Extension Homemakers Council donated awards. AWARDS WILL BE GIVEN AT THE AWARDS PROGRAM FRIDAY September 4, 2026. High point winners in the exhibit building will be announced at the awards ceremony Friday, September 4, 2026 held in the Livestock show barn.

Home Economics and Horticulture exhibits must remain in place until Sunday, September 6, 2026 (youth livestock exhibitors may pick up exhibit building items Saturday evening after 9pm)

PRIZE MONEY WILL NOT BE AWARDED IF EXHIBITS ARE REMOVED BEFORE DEADLINES.

CLUB AWARDS

Adults and youth clubs, whose members accumulate the most points in the exhibit building, will be given recognition at the awards program. To be eligible for this award, a list must be left at the fair office by

7:00pm Monday, August 31, 2026. The number of points an individual accumulates is based on BLUE, RED, AND WHITE ribbons.

TABLE SETTINGS

Entered Sunday, August 30, 2026

In addition to the exhibit building rules.

EACH TABLE SETTING SIZE IS 24in X 24in

This division is open on a first come first serve basis to all exhibitors.

Exhibitors may pre-register to reserve a spot by calling Caramie at the Extension Office 479-738-6826.

Exhibits must be placed by the individual exhibitor and no additional persons will be allowed in the table staging area.

Each exhibit must have a theme (birthday, holiday, party, etc.) with a balanced menu and the needed/appropriate dinnerware and flatware to accompany the menu. (Ex. A soup on the menu = a bowl included in setup).

Menu and theme may be written or typed on a 5x7 card that must be framed.

All items being used must be brought and set up at one time. No changes can be made after initial set-up.

Only **ONE** place setting and themed decor for each table.

Participants are required to furnish their own tablecloths, mats, dinnerware, flatware, etc.

All exhibits will be placed in a designated area. However, the Fair Board cannot be held responsible for any loss or damage to property.

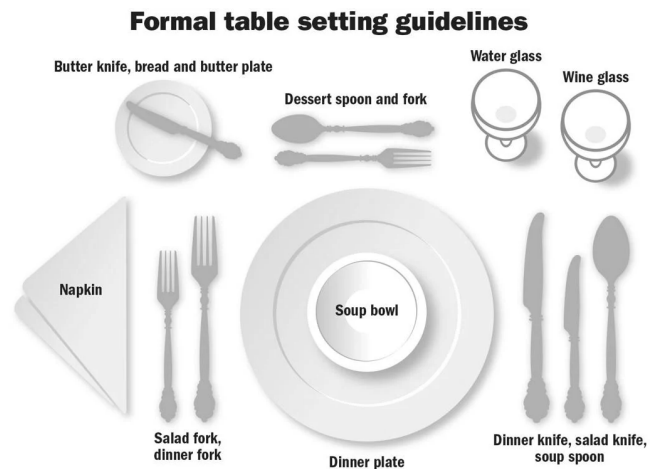
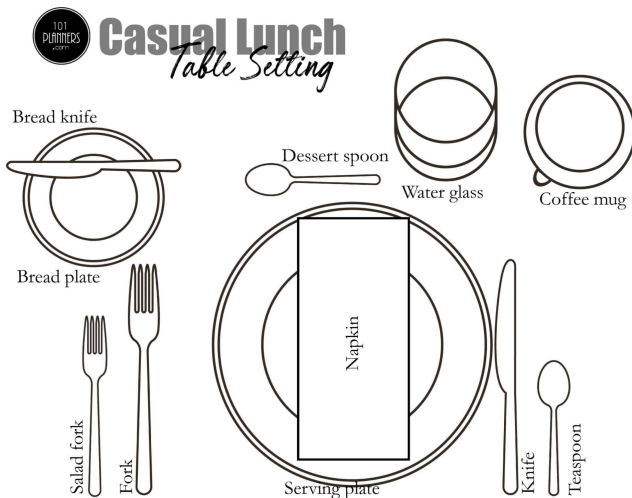

FINE ARTS

Entered Sunday, August 30, 2026

ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE FRAMED AND PROPERLY EQUIPPED FOR HANGING. Art should be ready to hang, with picture wire hangers consisting of wire stretched between eye hooks screwed into the frame. No saw-tooth hangers, soft drink tab hangers, string, twist-ties, filament hangers, or any other type of hanger that is taped or glued to the artwork will be acceptable for any framed entry.

Picture wire, if securely attached to a saw-tooth hanger by the exhibitor, will be accepted.

Only framed artwork or artwork on canvases with finished edges will be accepted. (except for Section K – China Painting.)

Paint-by-numbers, pre-printed sheets & canvases, adult coloring book pages and murals are not accepted in this department.

Children 8 years and younger may enter artwork in the Handi-Crafts Department.

All artwork must be original work of the exhibitor, made in the year since the previous fair and not previously shown at the Madison County Fair.

Non copyrighted cartoon characters are allowed.

All entries must be appropriate for viewing by all audiences. Artwork that is deemed inappropriate will NOT be displayed.

FRAMED ARTWORK SHOULD BE NO SMALLER THAN 5" x 7" AND NO LARGER THAN 24" x 30". **Please note that all entries will be inspected for size and proper attachment of standard picture wire hangers. Entries that are submitted in broken frames or with the artwork not securely inserted in the frame will not be accepted. Thank you for your patience and cooperation. **

PHOTOGRAPHY

Entered Sunday, August 30, 2026

Photos must be 4 x 6" Size strictly enforced.

All photos must MATTED/MOUNTED ON THE FRONT OF WHITE cardstock.

White Card Stock MAT/MOUNT MUST BE NO LARGER THAN 5 x 7"

NO Framed or Photos with hangers.

Only one picture may be entered per class. Per exhibitor

The exhibitor **MUST NOT** be photographed in personal entry unless entered as a "Self Portrait".

Photos must have been taken within 12 months following the previous year's fair.

The same picture may not be entered in both black and white and color.

Criteria for Judging

Pictures Quality – 20%

Is this picture in focus; exposed correctly; sharp or grainy; blurry; clean (no dust spots, scratches, smudges, or fingerprints); correct shutter speed used; correct lighting; contrast; color (processor's fault sometimes); appropriate use of flash; consider technical aspects of picture in this area.

Storytelling Ability – 40%

Is one idea presented; what story does the picture tell; significance of picture or subject; does it have impact; is it unusual, interesting, or blah; is it just a "pretty picture"; what is emotional effect.

Composition – 40%

If it is unsealed at the time of drop off or becomes unsealed during judging it will be disqualified.

Anything preserved in a nonstandard canning jar will not be accepted.

Examples of nonstandard canning jars are jars that originally had a store-bought product in them (mayo, pickles, etc...)

All jars must be clean. Quilted jars or jars with patterns make it difficult to judge, please use jars that have at least one side clear and smooth.

All jars must be clear glass, no colored jars.

Judges will use USDA standards when judging headspace and safe canning practices.

Food coloring is not allowed unless a section states otherwise.

Paraffin is not allowed. Please attach a label to each jar's entry tag with the following information: date product was preserved and method of preservation used (water bath or pressure)

ABOUT THE MADISON COUNTY FAIR

HISTORY

The first fair held in Madison County was in 1923.

Then it was known as the "Madison County Fair and annual School Meet".

Exhibits were displayed in the School Building and in the middle of Huntsville Square.

At the time the county was divided into nine districts and from what we read in newspaper clippings and the stories that have been passed down through generations, they were very competitive. Within a couple years the fair had grown in the county wide participation and was renamed the Madison County Fair and Harvest Festival. Exhibits were displayed in the American Legion Hut, Grade School Buildings and the new ballpark. Floats were built on horse drawn wagons as a parade made its way through the town square. There was approximately \$300.00 in premium money which was donated by local businessmen from Huntsville, Hindsville, St Paul and Kingston.

PRESENT

Making sure that our roots are not forgotten we proudly display exhibits in the traditional divisions of canning, cooking, heritage skills, sewing, horticulture and of course the displaying of hard work year around in the livestock show. We have continued the tradition of education by having local clubs and organizations set up educational booths as well as local

Extension Homemakers Club displaying the lost but not forgotten skills of homemaking. We continue on with steady growth but admit, each year becomes increasingly harder to keep a county fair going. We are among the top in the state as a small county fair. We have a hard working group of people who are dedicated to making our fair a success. We take pride in our county fair and with the exhibit buildings and livestock barns being filled and the continued support from those local and state-wide, we are proud to say we are debt free.

FUTURE

Our goal is to continue to grow, educate and to get more youth involved. We will continue our educational process through new techniques of heritage skills, food preservation, horticulture and livestock which has an effect on family life whether it be direct or indirect. Exhibiting at county fairs helps to educate the public in these new techniques. Future plans are to enlarge the livestock barn and the continuation of renovating the exhibit building that would be suitable for the entertainment and could be rented to other organizations for meetings. We are committed to making our good fair even better and will strive to continue working to keep the fair growing steadily each year.
