# **Framing Statement:**

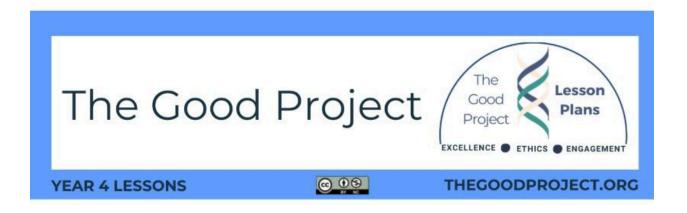
